

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of June 28, enclosing a communication dated June 7, 1954, addressed to you by Rev. H. W. Case, of Emmet, North Dakota, who requests establishment of clinics or first aid centers at several points on the Fort Berthold Reservation to eliminate excessive travel for Indians who require medical attention.

We are asking the Director of our Aberdeen Area Office to investigate the conditions described by Mr. Case and to take such corrective action as is possible with the means at his disposal. Upon receipt of the Area Director's report, we will be glad to communicate with you further.
