ABSTRACT

The 1966 Republican Campaign in North Dakota discusses the efforts of the Party from May, 1965 through November, 1966. The pre-convention period illustrates the effort of the North Dakota Republicans to rebuild their organization after the 1964 defeat. Analysis of this effort is made with regard to finances, organization, and research.

The study then discusses the 1966 state convention, the rise of youth in the Party organization, background and insight into all the races, and a complete tabulation of all ballots. Special emphasis is placed on the problem of the John Birch Society and on how that problem was resolved by the Party.

The chapter on the primary campaign analyzes the Party's management of the races for Labor Commissioner and Public Service Commissioner. The races of Tom Kleppe against conservative Martin Vaaler in the west and Richard Larsen in Grand Forks are especially noted. The difficulty of organizational adjustment to reapportionment is also discussed here. A complete breakdown of all winners is listed--including all precinct committeemen.

The final chapter gives a first hand description of the November campaign. Results of all campaigns for

all offices are given. The study is comprised almost entirely of original research obtained from first hand interviews through involvement in and cooperation with the North Dakota Republican Party.

CHAPTER |

THE PERIOD OF ADJUSTMENT -- MAY 1965-JUNE 1966

It was May of 1965 and a meeting of the Central Committee of the North Dakota Republican Party brought up the matter of electing a state chairman. Mr. Tom Secrest, Senator Oscar Sorlie and Dr. Ben Clayburgh were nominated. Fifty-five members were present and a majority was needed to elect. At the end of the balloting Secrest had 27 votes, Sorlie had 26, and Clayburgh had 2. On the second vote Secrest squeezed out the necessary majority (1).

This vote was the culmination of effort of a small number of people in the Party; and this group could very realistically be considered the embryo of what is now known as the Republican Organization in North Dakota. The original purpose of these Republican leaders (among them Lindsay from Cass, Elkin from Stark, and Larson from Burleigh County) was to visit informally and discuss the path the Party would have to follow if it were ever again to reach a position of leadership in the state (2).

As the meetings progressed one main sore spot continually erupted. There was no organization patronage for elected Republican officials through the state party. For example, officials were hiring in response to individual contributors and not through the Party. As a result,

these officials' loyalities rested with individuals or pressure groups and not with the Republican Party. At the same time, with an extremely weak organization in existence these officials saw little choice but to garner support from any possible source in order to get elected. The more this occurred, the weaker the Party grew (3).

The first warning signals occurred in 1960, and 1964 was the complete disaster. These individuals saw the revitalization of the Party organization as the only solution to the impending destruction of the Party as an effective body.

Secrest wasted no time. He was elected on a Wednesday afternoon, and at 9 a.m. the following morning he requested the entire headquarters staff to resign as of June 1. He then hired Marlys Fleck as office manager, and initiated a plan to organize nine Republican conferences (Bismarck, Williston, Minot, Devils Lake, Grand Forks, Fargo, Jamestown, Mandan and Dickinson) during the summer and fall of 1965 to present his goals to the rank and file membership.

The primary goal behind these conferences was the hope that individual precincts could be strengthened. Without these primary building blocks there can be no effective county (now district) organization, and without that there can be no effective state Party. The point was clearly made in a letter sent to all precinct committeemen from the Chairman July 6, 1965. In part it stated:

. . . The Republican Party has to rely on you precinct

committeemen to do the work necessary to win elections, and if you fail to do your job, then we lose the election.

If you are unable to do the necessary work as precinct committeemen, then you should let your County Chairman know so that he knows where his weaknesses are now -not two days before the election (4).

On the 14th of June, the Central Committee and the Executive Committee met. The latter met first at 10 a.m. in the Grand Pacific Hotel. The immediate problem this group had to deal with concerned money. The party was in desperate shape with less than \$1,000 on hand and debts from 1964 of over \$13,000. Debate then followed concerning the method to be used in establishing guotas. Stan Saugstad explained that the formula previously used took into consideration 1) the last Republican vote for Governor, 2) the total population of the county, and 3) the county's sales tax receipts. It was extremely complicated and resulted in complaints by members of the various problems posed in collecting funds in rural vs urban areas and Republican vs Democrat areas. The committee finally accepted a straight assessment of 50¢/vote for governor in 1964. This established a budget of \$58,000 for 1965 (5).

Secrest then presented a plan to establish judicial district campaign committees consisted of one member of the Executive Committee and four other people from the district. The purpose was to initiate more activity at the local level and tie it directly with the State Party through the Executive Committee. In conjunction with this Secrest proposed

that two legislative campaign committees be established to ascertain which areas would be marginal in 1966 (6).

It was also at his first executive committee meeting that Secrest suggested that the State Party take an active role in the development of the college and teenage Republicans through leadership and financial assistance. Leo Bergeron moved and Ralph Christensen seconded that the executive committee act on the proposal. The motion carried (7).

From this meeting Secrest moved to his first meeting of the State Central Committee which convened at 1:30 p.m. After informing the group of action taken by the executive committee (quotas, etc.), Secrest proposed the establishment of a constitution and by-laws committee to update the technical language of the party's constitution. This was approved. Secrest then addressed the group's attention to the college and teenage Republicans and the central committee subsequently gave him the authority to assist them as seen necessary (8).

At this point the committee launched into the highly sensitive debate concerning the Democrat tax plan and whether the Republican Party should officially support it, oppose it, or not take an official stand. Harvey Larson of Burleigh County moved that the Party not take a specific stand and allow the people to vote only on the issue rather than as a Party challenge. On a standing vote there were 14 ayes and 15 nayes and the motion lost (9).

Arthur Heck moved that the Party officially oppose the tax package. Donald Moore moved it be tabled and a spirited debate followed. When a vote was finally taken, a 30th member was rushed in and 15 cast aye and 15 nay. Chairman Secrest cast an aye vote and the motion was tabled (10).

Jack Bernabucci asked what could be done when citizens ask about the Republican position. It was here that Don Halcrow suggested that interested Republican legislators meet and condense the tax bill to understandable language, and inform the electorate accordingly. Finally, Minot was named as the location for the 1966 Republican Nominating Convention and the meeting was adjourned (11).

The summer of 1965 was spent attempting to get the Party back on its feet financially and organizationally. Very little information exists as to the Party's activities during this time; however, the executive committee meeting of November 12, 1965, in Minot indicated that, outside of individual contacts, the summer was generally quiet. Secrest used this time to get the state headquarters moved to the Rausch building. The crates of old correspondence and literature were cleaned out, an up-todate clipping service was established, and an old automatic typewriting machine which had been stored away for years was dusted off (12). It was during this time that Harvey Larson (Burleigh) and Representative Richard Larsen (Grand Forks) traveled to Ohio and Kansas to study party

efficiency and research methods and procedures (13). This culminated in the November 12 executive committee meeting which signaled the transition of the 1966 campaign into an active stage.

The treasurer's report showed expenses from June 13th to November 12th of \$7,506.65. Receipts totaled \$12,975.45. The cash on hand was still under \$1,000 (\$907.29) but unpaid bills dropped to \$8,250 (14).

At this point a proposal was submitted to immediately establish Legislative Campaign Committees in each newly reapportioned district with the following officers: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary-Treasurer, Finance Director, Organizational Director, and YR or CYR Chairman (15). Harvey Larson presented maps of all the new legislative districts, including a complete 1964 vote analysis of those The idea was that if the Republicans could districts。 quickly and efficiently make the inevitable switch to district organizations and gear the campaign plans through them, they would be that much further ahead. Further, any delay on the part of the Democrats would be a solid Republican gain. The immediate reaction was typical of the confusion felt by Party leaders. Then leaders had the job of completely rearranging their organizations, which in many cases was to be painful indeed (16). For example, counties such as Towner were split down the middle and all semblance of representation was lost (17). It was unquestionably the leadership and approach used by all Party leaders which

accomplished this task. The primary use of these new organizations as the Party's building blocks was to become the major source of strength to the Party during the campaign.

After this matter had been thoroughly aired, Chairman Secrest proposed the hiring of two full time fieldmen -one in each Congressional District. These men would have the job of acting as a catalyst to promote the establishment of the new campaign committees. They would also assist in the collection of quotas and in the general spotting of trouble in the various districts (18).

Next, the Committee tackled the problem of finances. A budget of \$135,000 was established for 1966, and the quotas were fixed on the basis of the number of senators in the new legislative districts (19). All told the meeting lasted 3-1/2 hours, and, except for a short talk from Senator Young, dealt entirely with Party organization and the upcoming campaign (20).

Chairman Secrest constantly claimed to be building the organization and the Party in the shadow of Ray Bliss. He stressed the necessity of the "nuts and bolts in politics" and was certainly in his glory at that meeting (21). He admitted being nervous when a committee launched the theory of the path ahead for the party (22). And with everything from theory to the John Birch Society, he was due many nervous moments in the months to come! In fact, only three weeks later (December 4, 1965) the executive

committee moved to Devils Lake, and "theory" seemed to make up for the neglect it received in Minot.

At the December 4 meeting the first matter was with regard to finances. Confressman Andrews -- through Richard Goldberg -- requested that money Andrews collected through his Marksmen organization be credited to the quotas of the individual districts to a maximum of 50% of the quota and a maximum total of \$20,000. It was argued that this would be contrary to the basic premise of a strong state organization, and that if this is allowed every one else should be permitted to do the same thing. This was refuted on the grounds that Andrews was alloted \$20,000 in the state budget and that any money collected would merely be deducted from the State Party's contribution to his campaign. The proposal was adopted (23).

It was then suggested that the convention delegates be determined on the basis of 15/state Senator, or a total of 735. Proponents argued that this would give the rural districts a more meaningful delegation and would increase the general interest in the convention. After a brief exchange relative to whether the Party could persuade 735 people to attend a convention in the middle of the summer, the proposal was adopted (24).

The final matter on the agenda was a request by Senator Young that the State Party publish the 13th Report of the Senate Fact Finding Sub-Committee on Un-American Activities, published by the Senate of the State of Cali-

fornia in 1965. Proponents argued that the Party has an obligation to support its elected officials against the attacks of the Society. Opponents argued that the Party should stay out of Senator Young's squabble, and that it did not have sufficient funds to become involved. The proposal, however, was accepted by a ten to four roll call vote and the ad was published in the major newspapers in the State (25).

The State Party continued to sponsor seminars and workshops in the various districts in the state to finalize the transition to the legislative districts. Jane Gray Smith of Bismarck, Director of the Miss North Dakota Pageant for several years, took on the job of coordinating the women's efforts in the legislative districts. The State Party continually emphasized the importance of using the 1964 vote analysis and of spending the time concentrating on the precincts where the greatest potential vote existed. The money appeared to be coming in more satisfactorily, and by mid-February, 1966, the 1964 debt was paid and nearly \$10,000 was on hand (26). However, with increasing expenses and the campaign in sight, the State Central Committee was called by the chairman to meet February 19th in Bismarck. Finances were the only subject on the agenda and no fewer than 33 legislative districts were represented (27).

The reason for the interest became apparent when Mr. Robert Stroup moved that the central committee establish

a bonus of delegates to the convention on the following formula. One additional delegate if the first 25% of the quota was submitted March 15; another if 50% was paid by April 15; another if 75% of the quota was paid by May 15; and a 4th if 100% was paid by June 15th. The proposal was defeated 13 to 22 (28). Mr. William Richman (Cass) then moved that only the number of delegates be seated as are proportional with the amount of the quotas paid. This motion also failed; however, the committee submitted the issue of a bonus system into the agenda of the convention (29). And so, after all the suspense, no financial decisions were made at this meeting. However, a part of the purpose must have been served because the quotas began to dribble in a little bit faster -- for a while (30).

The three month period from the middle of March until the convention became the dry and lean season for the Party. The districts with money were holding out until the convention to get the recognition, and so even the good sources shrank. By the middle of May, the Party had less than \$3,000 on hand, and if the convention had come a few days later, an office staff would have been unpaid (31).

The encouraging part of this final pre-convention period came from the activity of the State Party. A supplement to the precinct manual and a campaign manual was being published with volunteer help. Marlys Fleck reported

that a new filing system was being introduced and a manual of all active Republicans in North Dakota was being prepared. The East District Fieldman was concentrating efforts on the coordination of the multi-county districts; the West District Fieldman attended a public relations seminar in Washington and was concentrating on improvement of the Party's image with the weekly newspapers in the state, and the Chairman was unfolding a general plan of action to carry the Party from the convention to the primary election with a minimum of confusion (32). Generally, this Republican Party was almost as poor as it was one year earlier; however, it was becoming clear that the similarity ended on that note.

CHAPTER II

THE CONVENTION

The 1966 Republican State Nominating Convention was scheduled to convene at Minot, North Dakota, June 15-17 and quickly became one of the longest and largest in the state's history. In the wake of persistent criticism concerning the convention reorganization, a full 735 delegates, plus alternates, began converging upon the north central city as early as Monday, June 13, 1966. This convention, which had been planned with the hope of eliminating as much as possible of the confusion and consternation so typical of political conventions, became an idealist's dream (33).

As the delegates began to arrive, they registered at the Clarence-Parker Hotel -- Convention Headquarters. Then, beginning Wednesday afternoon, each legislative district planned to caucus for one hour during which time all the candidates would speak and answer questions. It was hoped that the delegates would be saved the futility of having to pursue the candidates to talk with them (34).

These caucuses were to continue through Thursday evening with a convening of the convention briefly Thursday morning. This would serve to break the monotony of straight caucuses. This convening would give the delegates time to

get familiar with the floor arrangements; and most importantly, it would permit the party officials the advantage of disposing of electing a temporary chairman and secretary, along with many of the time-consuming reports and details. This would leave Friday free for the business of acting on resolutions and nominations for offices.

That these corrections in convention procedure were long overdue was never disputed; however, the 1966 convention was dealing with an extremely light work load. The eastern congressional district was concerned only with nominations for the newly created office of Labor Commissioner and the office of Public Service Commissioner along with the resolutions. The western district had a stiff race for congressman. Yet the overall picture nowhere nearly approached previous conventions in terms of the number of offices open for nomination and the number of candidates competing (35).

No fewer than 14 phones lined the convention platform to immediately handle any arising complication; plus telephones lined the floor for delegation heads, and walkie talkies were available to maintain optimum efficiency on the floor. An overhead projector to be used in vote tabulations was converted to a message service so all delegates could be aware of any cars to be moved, keys lost, etc. (36).

There was no question that a couple of incidents on the floor during that Thursday morning session completely

distracted from the unparalleled job of organizations accomplished by the State Chairman. According to plan, the College Republican Federation had the responsibility of supplying and organizing the pages on the floor. The Young Republicans had the job of checking credentials through the Sargeant-at-Arms. Trouble began when the Sargeant-at-Arms failed to arrive on the scene. The ten to fifteen College Republican pages then had to thin themselves out to cover all the entrances onto the floor. It was perhaps only inevitable that college students' acting as policemen would convey the impression to some delegates -especially the veterans -- of disorganization (37). Far more serious than this, though, was the failure of the public address system; and the ironical part of this was that the pet peeve of the State Chairman was meeting and gatherings where the speaker system had not been provided. As a result, each fieldman carried a portable, battery powered speaker system for these meetings. These were brought into the convention, along with red bull horns from the Minot Fire Department, all to no avail (38). The public address system had been checked at 7:30 a.m. that morning as a precaution. All this probably served to give Chairman Secrest his biggest single shock since taking office. As was indicated earlier, Secrest is not unknown for his temper, and it was undoubtedly to his credit that even during this frustration, he never once lost his compusure.

After nearly two hours of confusion and delay on the

floor, a temporary chairman and secretary were elected via the overhead projector, which was probably another first in North Dakota conventions. The session was adjourned immediately and a sort of an anti-climax crept into the delegates on the floor as they began to filter back to their hotels (39). Consequently, the following comment characterized the 1966 Republican Convention: "Sure, it was alright, but they spent an awful lot of time doing nothing" (40).

There were other things which signified that this convention was an invigorating and healthful indicator of future campaigns. One of these became known, first by the veterans, as the "youth kick," and indeed it was. Not only were the college and high school students in charge of pages and checking credentials, but no fewer than ten college Republicans attended the convention as voting delegates. Students from Grand Forks, Cass, Stark, Bottineau and Rolette counties became one more indicator that the Party was changing. In former years, a young person had little to say concerning the posture of the Party. He had to prove himself worthy rather than vice versa, and this was what characterized the Democrats as the "Party of the Young" (41). Chairman of the College Republicans, Joseph Crawford, asked the Republican Women's Federation, Wednesday morning, June 15th, to "demand that your candidates have a future to offer the Republican Party, not just a past" (42). In less than two years the Party had come to recognize its defici-

ency to the point of bending over backwards in attempting to correct it. Yet, a Party that took a generation to be destroyed would certainly take at least two years to be rebuilt, and this served as a beginning.

To some, the 1966 Republican convention was long and unnecessary; to others, it served as a rallying point, not a point of total victory, but certainly not a point of defeat. Rather, it may become known as a point of new beginning, imagination, and opportunity in the Party's future. It may have served as a starting gate to return that political party to a position of influence and leadership in North Dakota.

The race for the office of Public Service Commissioner began dramatically and ended with a near anti-climax (43). The individuals in groups demanding that the Party "growup" saw this race as a major battlefield between themselves and those who felt the Party organization was not to be emphasized as highly as the candiate's own efforts, organization and contacts. This would make him responsible in matters of patronage and party structure to no one except those individual contacts and contributors. And so Chairman Secrest, many of the county chairmen and especially the young people in the Party, began to see all the progress already made and the hopes for the future fade away right before their eyes. They began to visualize spending months working to establish a strong Republican organization only to elect a candidate who would not support it (44).

In the early spring of 1966, these Republicans began to look for a candidate who would present a youthful image, the determination to develop and grow within the party, and a loyalty to the Party organization. They thought they found their answer in the form of Richard Elkin of Taylor, North Dakota (45). Mr. Elkin, although only in his early thirties, had served in the House of Representatives, had been county chairman of the Republican organization of the western part of the state and had indicated very strongly the need for a more dynamic and strong Republican organization. His work on the platform committee indicated that he was extremely concerned with developing a platform that the people would read and that the candidates could run on and unite behind as another instrument of the Party. However, it was not until late in May that he finally decided to become a candidate and then it was with the condition that Representative Richard Larsen, a young, 29 year old legislator from Grand Forks County, and himself a candidate for the State Senate in the 18th legislative district, would act as his campaign manager (46). And so the actual campaign did not develop until late May as far as publicity publications and the making of the initial contacts prior to the opening of the convention. In the beginning, making arrangements for the campaign, Representative Larsen made the point that any candidate running for a statewide office such as this and seeking nomination at a convention should probably have spent two

full years in preparation for such a race. The one month of preparation gave the indication to all the original supporters that the nomination would probably be a very difficult race (47).

This is probably where the major discrepancy began. The other probable candidates were Phil Hoghaug and John Erickson, both former State Treasurers, Dean Miller, a former Public Service Commissioner, and Glenn Wilmer, an employee of the Public Service Commission for nine years. Elkin supporters expected them to be organizing and to be spending a great deal of time, effort and money organizing prior to the convention (48). However, these people just did not take the time and effort in the preparation of their own campaigns (49). As an example, Mr. Wilmer had not even bothered to insure that someone would nominate him. As a result, no one on the floor did nominate him and his name was not placed on the ballot (50). In fact, by Wednesday night of the convention, Phil Hoghaug decided not to become a candidate and the race had narrowed to Elkin, Dean Miller and John Erickson. Mr. Miller who is from Fordville, North Dakota, and was being sponsored by the Walsh County organization, became extremely popular at the convention (51). Everyone seemed to like him and have a great deal of respect for him. But, Mr. Miller did not appear to be running as a serious candidate (52). On Wednesday evening, his daughter, Linda, went to the Elkin Headquarters and indicated she would be working for Dick

Elkin for the nomination (53). John Erickson spent most of his time in the pre-convention millings in the lobby of the Clarence-Parker Hotel meeting individuals who passed through, and evidently had no campaign organization of any consequence (54). And so the Elkin group, which had geared itself to a streamlined forceful campaign, by Wednesday evening failed to see any organization developing in opposition.

Immediately that Wednesday evening a group of Elkin supporters met on the third floor of the the Clarence-Parker Hotel to discuss ways of making an impending Elkin victory as large and as significant a one as possible. This group consisted of Representative Richard Larsen, Harvey Larson, Burleigh County Chairman, Dr. Warren Lee of Bismarck, George Boehlman of Grand Forks, Bill Kelsh, candidate for the legislature from Morton County, Gary Hendricks, former western district fieldman, Elkin, Joe Crawford of Grand Forks, Tom Wold of Fargo, Lindsay and Hindsman (55). These were joined later by many others but primarily they organized to contact individuals within each ^{of} the 39 legislative districts to begin garnering what would become an overwhelming victory for Mr. Elkin (56). When the time for the balloting came, Elkin took the lead from the very first precinct obtaining 13 votes while Erickson and Miller each received 1. This began a trend that was to continue throughout all the balloting to the very end, so that after the first four or five districts

there was no doubt as to the outcome. Surprisingly, one of the biggest problems in the Elkin campaign at the convention was to decide who was to nominate and who was to second the nomination for the candidate. His supporters wanted someone who was young and prominent and would present a youthful image. Representative Larsen was, of course, disgualified because of being his campaign manager; Bill Kelsh declined on the basis that he could not prepare an adequate speech overnight; Dr. Warren Lee declined and suggested Mrs. Lee who also declined; and finally, the name of the Public Service Commissioner, Mr. Richard Thompson, was suggested. Mr. Thompson was immediately contacted and he agreed to take on the job (57). It became very clear that the convention was in the mood for a change. They wanted to see a candidate with a future to offer the Republican Party. And so, the reception of Richard Elkin became complete.

The 1965 Session of the Legislature authorized a Department of Labor and a State Commission of Labor. However, no appropriations were made for the Department at that time. The Republicans at the Convention considered this an opportunity to run for a type of office which had been in control of the Democrats in most sections of the country, and one which could be critical in regaining some of the losses incurred during the 1964 election. There were at least two things which distinguished the Labor Commissionership race from that of the race for Public

Service Commissioner. The first of these was that it was far more highly contested than was the race for Public Service Commissioner. There was definite doubt right up to the balloting as to actually who would come out the winner. Also, this contest was run from much more of a professional level. To the common convention delegate and especially the younger ones, the battle for Labor Commissioner was a reflection of the party leadership rather than of the delegates as a whole (58). There were three candidates for the office. The first to declare was Mr. Joseph Glazer of Bismarck who was an official in the Department of Agriculture and Labor under Arnie Dahl. Early in the spring Commissioner Dahl came out for Joe Glazer by publishing a letter endorsing his candidacy and distributing it to the delegates. Glazer had been known as a fighter in the organization. A laborer, he had brought the Republican party much in the way of labor support in past years. He was very probably a leader early in the convention. The second candidate was Richard Paulson of Fargo who was an accountant for General Motors and at the present time had his own construction company in Fargo. He was a representative in the 1963-64 session of the legislature and a member of the Labor, State and Federal Government, Judiciary and Audit and Fiscal Review committees. A third candidate was Mr. Vance Hill, an attorney from Bismarck, North Dakota.

Mr. Glazer had been supported by Mr. Dahl of Bis-

marck and had been receiving considerable support evidently from Mr. Irv Smith, a very significant Republican power. There has been a great deal of conjecture since the convention as to just why Smith became so involved in a candidate for a position such as Labor Commissioner, and why so much emphasis had been placed on this race even to the neglect of the congressional races. These individuals were concerned about getting a labor man into a position for the nomination of Labor Commissioner and this could very well have been used as a rallying point behind the candidate Glazer. He was a laborer, a fighter, a good speaker -- the best of the three as far as a speaker -and yet these strong advantages were lost midway through the county or the district caucuses. This happened because Glazer presented his image of a fighter, a rough laboring individual, to the delegates in a way that severely irritated and even antagonized many of them (59). The first of these irritations arose over the issue of the right to work. In the caucuses where Mr. Glazer appeared he made no mention at all of this issue. The point was made by the Burleigh County chairman, Harvey Larson, that the issue of the right to work itself was not going to be a significant one in the campaign -- that the people just were not concerned about it -- and that a Republican candidate on the right to work issue would not gain that much and would instead have quite a bit to loose (60). This was probably a very valid point, but as Joe Glazer's speech

before the Grand Forks County delegation came to a close and questioning ended it was rumored that Glazer's own personal commitment was against a right to work law. And so outside the caucus room he was asked by the convention delegate members of the College Young Republicans to explain his own personal views on the right to work issue (61). Mr. Glazer responded to this inquiry in an almost belligerent manner. He countered that no one in the Republican party should be "saddled" with the right to work issue, that it was only a loosing position, and that it would ruin a Republican candidate's chances in the fall (62). The student persisted and pointed out that even though it might not be an open issue in the campaign and might better be left alone, the delegates still had a right to know the candidate's own personal opinion on an issue so relevant to the office at hand (63).

It was at this point that matters deteriorated. Mr. Glazer evidently was suspicious of people asking questions right outside the caucus rooms and suspected that these individuals were attempting to embarrass or trap him before the delegates passing back and forth (64). But, his response and reaction to the question only created greater interest among a growing number of the delegates. Finally, after approximately a half hour Mr. Glazer stated that he thought every worker should have the right to determine whether or not he would join a union but that if a union was active in a company the non-union members should be

paying for the benefits derived from that union. This is actually the way the law states in North Dakota. North Dakota has a right to work law but it also allows unions which are organized within companies to make an agreement with the company that individuals will have to pay something for the benefits they are receiving, even though they may not actively take part in the union itself. And, this answer would probably have been perfectly acceptable by those individuals questioning the candidate. He was then asked what he would state to a group during the campaign if questioned on his opinion of North Dakota's right to work law? Many of the unions in North Dakota have expressed the desire to do away with the states right to work law. And he, as a laborer in the position of Labor Commissioner, might find this situation occurring both during the campaign as well as after the election, the students contended.

Mr. Glazer stated very bluntly that he would "cross that bridge" when he came to it, and after more than an hour and a half of argument outside the two caucus rooms in the Clarence-Parker Hotel the candidate never veered from this stand (65). The students argued that as delegates they had to cross that bridge now and that consequently they had a right to know how he would react before the public. Then to complicate the situation, Mr. Glazer indicated that he and his supporters had been in politics far longer than the students questioning him,

and they -- the students -- should leave the matters up to the professionals (66). This was a disastrous thing to say to these young people. They were firmly of the belief that it was because of too many people on top of the party who felt that they had all the answers, and too few workers and the young people in the ranks of the party that the party had been going down hill for so many years. And, so the gathering disbursed with the concensus that Mr. Glazer had signaled the battle call to these young people (67).

The Grand Forks County chairman, Dr. Clayburgh, was asked if the delegation from the 18th district could have another caucus to bring the matter to the attention of the delegates. Chairman Clayburgh indicated that this would be the case.

That caucus was called on the convention floor and as the Grand Forks County delegates moved off the floor into one of the wings, one of the more dramatic moments of the convention occured. At that time candidate Glazer walked up the aisle into the wings to talk to the Grand Forks delegates. He reaffirmed the same argument that he had made previously that he not be "saddled" with the right to work law. However, he went on to issue a challenge to the delegates that either they must endorse him or a Democrat would be elected in November. He pointed out that the Democrats were in effect campaigning against him because

they knew he was the only really strong candidate (68). As the Grand Forks County delegates talked among themselves it became clear there was still a wide dissention of views. Lee Greenberg, Grand Forks County Young Republican Chairman, pointed that Glazer would be a strong candidate (69). House of Representative candidate Stuart McDonald indicated that Glazer would be a stronger campaigning aid with local candidates in the labor areas of Grand Forks than either Paulson or Hill (70). They also pointed out that Paulson was an extremely weak speaker. He was admittedly very strong and very persuasive speaking with individuals but before caucuses he was difficult to follow and had difficulty concentrating upon specific areas and topics (71).

In response to this, other delegates such as Herb Stennis emphasized that the party was just in no position to take a chance on Joe Glazer, and Paulson with his experience and background in management and labor could be a strong candidate during the campaign (72). The delegates moved back onto the floor; and even though it definitely appeared that Paulson was an underdog, his chances looked improved (73).

The voting began like a teeter-totter. Glazer picked up 10 out of 15 votes in the first district. Paulson came back and took up 10 out of 15 votes in the second district. Glazer picked up 10 out of 15 votes in the third and Paulson picked up 10 out of 15 in the fourth. Back and fourth it went through Grand Forks District 18 where

it split 19 to 18 for Glazer with Vance Hill getting the other single vote.

At this point, Paulson was slightly ahead by approximately 25 to 30 votes, but then Paulson edged away slowly. During the next 5 legislative districts Paulson gained a full 85 votes and from that point it was just a matter of how large the lead would be.

Joe Glazer was visibly disappointed and hurt with the defeat. He did not move for a unanimous ballot for Paulson. Those people, including the students, who criticized him went to him and emphasized the need for a demonstrated loyalty to the Republican Party to insure a victory in the fall. Mr. Paulson declared that he would work as hard as possible in all the districts as the candidate for labor commissioner to support the individual candidates at the local level.

The convention officials made the decision to dispose of the automatic endorsement of Mark Andrews, incumbent congressman from the eastern half of the state, leaving the west free to fight out their endorsement. Even so, Andrews was not to let his "disposal" go unnoticed. As the official speeches concluded, and his nomination became unanimous, he moved up the center of the convention floor with his wife, Mary, and approached the podium. As his acceptance speech progressed, his manner increased in forcefulness; his rapid fire presentation of facts and specific illustration of evidence culminated this address

as the most impressive one by the Congressman in memory of many of the delegates. To compare this to his acceptance speech before the 1960 Republican Convention in Bismarck when running for Governor, would be to compare the ill at ease and nervous politician with the experienced and calm congressman (74).

His staff is noted for its efficient and professional ability to quickly assess the Congressman's strength and, more important, any errupting weakness. Monica Larivee in Grand Forks, Ann Candor in Fargo, John Perbowski as his field manager, Van Olson in Washington, and Ed Doherty as campaign manager compose an effective team. College students worked with Andrews during the summer in Washington as his interns. One of these, Butch Gullickson from Gilby, has served as chairman of the University of North Dakota College Republicans. Another University of North Dakota student, Steve Stennes, worked with the Republican Policy Committee and served as the editorial editor for the <u>Dakota Student</u>.

And so, the east rested its case. The delegates recessed and shuffled off the floor as if to avoid getting embroiled in the impending surge for the Western Congressional nomination.

In a sense, it was to be a struggle of the old vs the new, the veteran vs the rookie, the experienced vs the amateur. Tom Kleppe ran for the United States Senate in 1964 only after a long, hardhitting convention fight

against a friend and fellow Bismarck resident, former Governor John Davis. He ran in the wake of the disasterto-come, and began to foresee it weeks before the election (75). Yet, he did not let down his pace until the election itself, and suffered a terrible trouncing by incumbent Senator Quentin Burdick. The loss became both his biggest disadvantage and his chief asset. The main argument against him was that he was a loser. However, it did create an unswerving loyalty among his close associates. The people behind Tom Kleppe were there for good and he could count on them when he felt they were needed. They were experi-They had seen the past battles of a good number of enced. years. Weeks before they began to organize and count votes, and from the moment they arrived in Minot the pace never slackened (76).

Sam Burgess is a newspaper publisher at Dickinson, North Dakota, and a successful one at that. He had been interested in the political process for years but had not previously become involved as a candidate. His main supporters consisted of a small group of close friends who gathered on Sundays and discussed the problem of a liberal Democrat Congressman in the Republican stronghold of Western North Dakota. Their discussions led to the conclusion that a new, respected, successful face was needed to return the district to the fold. The face of Sam Burgess emerged (77).

The group began to plan and organize and discovered

two factors in their favor. They were not seriously hampered with a financial problem in the face of the Kleppe wealth; and they had an agressive attitude that to some resembled a personal crusade. They searched for votes in Burleigh County without even a passing concern that it was Kleppe's home delegation. They scurried about distributing material everywhere with a fever created by the first bite of the political bug, a fever never again matched as the antitoxin of experience began to absorb (78).

And so they were about to clash. The nominations were presented, the parades, balloons, horns, confetti, and other convention symbols died away when a man approached the podium and proceeded to place in nomination the candidacy of Edwin Becker of Willow City. A big, handsome state senator from Bottineau County, Becker had long been known as one of the rising stars in the Republican backfield. One of the party's best public speakers, he had been a candidate for the United States Senate nomination. Discussion became saturated with inquiry as to why he waited until the last minute to become a candidate (79). The most logical explanation was that he was not in reality a candidate at all. Several months before, Senator Becker had been instrumental in assisting with the organization of a College Republican Club at the Bottineau School of Forestry. He had spared nothing to help them get started, to maintain interest, and then to bring them into the senior party in that area of the state. Partly because of his interest,

some of these students went to the State Convention as delegates or alternates from the district. The explanation was that they helped promote much of this nomination merely as a favorite son and nothing more (80). In any event, Ed Becker's name was on the tabulation as the voting began.

One hundred seventy-two votes were needed for a majority of the delegates in the 19 legislative districts, composing the first Congressional District. In general the voting moved in a counter clockwise movement starting with districts in the northwest, across the north and around. Kleppe started with a one vote lead as the first legislative district cast 7 votes to Kleppe, 6 to Becker, and 2 for Burgess. Becker gained heavy strength across the north through his home county so that after 7 districts he had 55 votes to 44 for Kleppe and 33 for Burgess. At this point, Becker's strength disappeared and in the next 4 districts Kleppe moved to the lead with 79 and Burgess moved up to tie Becker at 56. The 32nd district was Burleigh County and the delegates became tense because the main Burgess theme was Kleppe could not get the votes. He could not in 1964 and "he will not get them from his own delegation." Burgess hoped he could illustrate this with stinging clarity and then hang on until subsequent votes began to take their toll of the Kleppe faithful. District 32 polled 30 votes for Kleppe, 2 for Becker, and 13 for Burgess. It stung, but not yet critically. The tally concluded with 156 for Kleppe, 63 for Becker, and 121 for

Burgess, just 16 votes short of a decision.

On the second tally, the Becker votes deteriorated sharply and after 7 districts Kleppe had moved to 55, a gain of 11; Burgess increased 9 to 42 and Becker slid to 37. The time had arrived for the Burgess camp. If Kleppe retained his past votes he needed only 4 more to reach 172. Any inroads would have to begin now. The next 4 districts returned Kleppe's identical vote, and again Burleigh County loomed: Kleppe 28, Becker 1, Burgess 16; Burgess had 35% of Kleppe's home vote. However, the final tally concluded at 168 for Kleppe, just 4 short. Burgess increased to 132, and Becker decreased to 43. At this point, a spokesman for Ed Becker moved to the podium to withdraw his name from the race.

Burgess had one final chance. With only 2 candidates, the decision would come on this the third ballot. The key would lie with the 43 Becker votes. Burgess needed most of them plus substantial numbers of Kleppe's (81). By the 7th district, it became plain they were not going to be for Sam Burgess. Kleppe actually gained 9 and picked up an additional vote in the next 4 districts. Burleigh County cost Kleppe 2 more votes but the remainder were committed solidly. Kleppe finished with 179 to 162 for Burgess.

It was indeed a tribute to the political process that a complete unknown could move up in the party structure as did Sam Burgess. Yet, it was no less a tribute to experience, loyalty and determination in that process because

Kleppe's determination and his supporter's loyalty delivered the final, crucial vote just when he had to have

The only remaining business before the convention was to deal with the resolutions, and only 2 of these gave an indication of raising a struggle. One of these concerned lowering the voting age to 19. The idea was introduced in the 1965 legislature by a Republican representative but it was killed in the Senate. It would necessitate a constitutional amendment and so would require a vote of the people.

The College Republican convention passed a resolution recommending the idea earlier in the spring and the Young Republicans followed suit at their state convention. Now, these young people asked the senior party to set the example. The surprising thing, at least to the college delegates, was that the resolution moved right through to approval with only one speaker in opposition, and before anyone had a chance to speak in favor of it (82).

The story was a slightly different one, however, with regard to the following resolution concerning the John Birch Society:

WHEREAS, the Republican Party achieved greatness through adherence to the American principles of freedom of expression, freedom of association and freedom of political belief, and

WHEREAS, the Republican Party will not fulfill its destiny by courting and embracing those who advocate excesses of the right or left, and

WHEREAS, the process of our American political

system depends on the abilities of the political parties to accomodate differing views, and

WHEREAS, it is the very essence of the political system that after thorough consideration and debate, a political party can only be effective if the members support policies and nominated or elected candidates,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Republican Party welcomes the help and active membership of all citizens. We encourage all Republicans to express their views regarding issues and candidates in a free but always responsible manner. We urge all Republicans to avoid membership in groups that tend to divide the Parties such as the John Birch Society and the Americans for Democratic Action. We deplore the actions of those who profess adherence to our Party but publicly and bitterly condemn our elected representatives and leaders chosen by majority vote in conventions and elections.

Resolutions Committee Members: Jack Huss, Chairman; Helen Woutat, Tom Wold, Senator A.W. Luick and Allan Young.

The rumor had circulated for weeks prior to the convention that something would be done with regard to the John Birch Society. The <u>Fargo Forum</u> obligingly released the statement of former State Chairman, Arley Bjella, that a resolution definitely would be submitted at the convention advocating complete disassociation of the Party from the John Birch Society. From this point on, practically all party officials claimed that dredging up the matter of 1966 would serve to hurt the Party no matter which direction the resolution took (83). If it were adopted, the Party it was argued, would alienate many of the workers who would be responsible for crystalizing the vitally needed victory November 8th. And, if it were rejected on the convention floor, the impression would be created that the Party in effect had embraced the Society. The Party leaders constantly pressured the resolution's supporters to the point of desperation, and, shortly after the convention began it appeared an agreement had been reached (84). It was at this point that the <u>Fargo Forum</u> proclaimed the convention was considering a watered down version of the resolution. The committee charged with deciding on the form to be submitted then drew up a relatively strong version.

The chairman recognized Mr. LaGrave from Morton County. Delegate LaGrave moved that the resolution be "placed on the table". In other words that it not be considered any further. The vote began almost immediately, remained tight throughout, and ended with 262 in support and 319 opposed. The resolution, therefore, became open for discussion and the chairman of the 18th legislative district, Dr. Ben Clayburgh, requested the podium. He began what was probably the most impassioned speech of his political career (which ranged from precinct committeeman to state chairman) (85). Dr. Clayburgh claimed that as State Chairman during the 1964 campaign, and as one of Goldwater's most ardent supporters, he encountered constant frustration as a result of the Society's activities outside the Party machinery. He concluded by stating that it was not improper to ask concerned Republicans to use their energy and resources within the Party. A delegate then made the error of moving the previous question (which would choke off debate and would require a 2/3 vote), because it pre-

sented the opportunity for the matter to get bogged down in a parliamentary maze. George Bowman, a Birch Society member from Grand Forks, called for a roll call vote to determine the 2/3, and an official polling of the Grand Forks delegation. It became apparent that the delegates were confused; many actually left in disgust; and others decided to abstain, but, none of these was the resolution's opponents (86).

Chairman Secrest, therefore, stated that if no one objected a vote would immediately be held on the resolution. This in itself was irregular, though perfectly proper, and took the Birch delegates off guard. When one finally did object, Secrest called for a vote on the objection which was a parliamentary fiction in the extreme. It worked, though, because the objection was shouted down and the resolution became a matter for final vote.

The question as to how the vote would end was in doubt only momentarily when, after the first 5 districts, it read 46 no and 44 yes. From then on, it was clear sailing. Grand Forks voted 34 to 3, Bismarck voted 33 to 2, Fargo tallied 37 to 7. The final was 373 yes and 170 no. The resolution was adopted.

And so the convention drew to a close. The delegates moved out of the convention hall, the Clarence-Parker Hotel, and Minot. They left with the full awareness of the coming months of work, worry and hope in a primary and a November campaign.

CHAPTER III

THE PRIMARY CAMPAIGN

The primary election of September 6 determined the candidates that each political party would offer to the public November 8; and 1966 provided one of the quietest primary campaigns.

However, a number of significant races did exist which traced most of the development of the Party during this period. Burleigh County was the first of these. The county has long been known for its ideal organization. Its money is always promptly collected; its surveys are completed months in advance; block workers show a combined determination matched only by the south central area of the state. The district nominated an exceptionally strong slate; and all indications were that the Democrats showed unusual weakness (88).

Yet, the Party officials -- and especially Chairman Harvey Larson -- were uneasy. In two areas Larson had difficulty finding competent people willing to file for the position of precinct committeeman and make the race to get elected. The precinct committeeman is the lowliest of elected state officials. Yet, he is the most fundamental building block in the structure of the Party. If the

cracks in the foundation are not sealed, the entire structure will soon deteriorate (89). Other individuals in the Party unconsciously contributed to the problem. At a number of Republican meetings, when area organization discussion turned to Burleigh County the comment would always be made, "well, it's certainly fortunate we don't have to worry about Burleigh." And if nobody else gave the effort in that district a second thought, perhaps there actually was no problem (90).

At the same time, two members of the John Birch Society filed for legislative nomination. Thus with three Senate seats and six House seats open, any letdown in the concentrated campaign to nominate the endorsed slate could very well result in the nomination of one or even both of the Society members. If this occurred Birch Society could become a fall campaign issue, and send two Democrats to the legislature (91).

The problem was short-lived, however, and much of its solution was attributable to the women of the county. They began to firm-up work in the blocks and provide the man-power needed to operate an efficient headquarters. Day after day, as many as ten women spent hours in the state headquarters assisting with needed projects. An experienced group of precinct committeemen were elected and the entire endorsed slate won nomination (92).

The problem facing the Republicans of Grand Forks County was substantially the same as Burleigh's, only

much more complicated. Six weeks before the primary election the need for precinct committeeman candidates was critical (93). And it was complicated by a number of factors. County Chairman Dr. Ben Clayburgh had worked to the point of exhaustion and was on a vacation in northern Canada. A renewed struggle between the city and the rural area posed a threat to Party unity. While in most parts of the state the two have learned to live with each other, they managed to constantly antagonize each other in Grand Forks. State Senators Day and Bridston fanned the flames in years past and John Scott from Gilby and Vernon Pederson from Northwood, as a sampling, have carried the torch the past few years (94).

However, the key to a decision seemed to centralize around control of the county Republican organization. It was senseless that this should be the battleground except for the fact that both factions blundered into it. The 1965 legislature was reapportioned into 39 "legislative districts," based upon population and as a result, a great number of the old traditional county organizations were geographically split. In this case the city of Grand Forks became the 18th legislative district and rural Grand Forks County became the 19th. And as was mentioned earlier, the two lost any significant relationship to each other. The city organization, however, became determined that it was sort of its duty to guarantee that the rural area was not "taken over" by the growing John Birch Society membership

under John Scott. Rather than calmly divide the county as the rest of the state had already done, the city, with only a few days remaining before the filing deadline for precinct committeemen made attempts to activate individuals in the rural area into filing for positions still open.(95). These attempts were substantially just that however, because 1) the city people had their hands full with problems in the city and just did not have the time to stage any kind of organized effort in the county, and 2) they encountered the incredible apathy of people who had always been elected merely by writing their names in on September 6th, and who could not see any sense in going door to door getting signatures on petitions and taking them all the way in to the county auditor to have the names placed on the ballot (96).

While this was going on the county people remembered that even though the legislature was reapportioned, the legal organization of the political parties was not. Therefore, even though the city of Grand Forks had 75% of the county's population, the rural area had 75% of the precinct committeemen (one for each township) and the precinct committeemen, by the old state law, could elect a county organization shortly after the primary election, even though it had no organizational significance (97).

The filing deadline arrived and a good half of the 75 precincts had no candidate who would appear on the ballot and whose election would thus be determined by

write-in votes. All but one of these were in the rural part of the county. After September 6 nearly all these positions were filled and the decisions these newly elected would make would become the first skirmish of the fall campaign.

In comparison to this, the primary campaign for the State Senate in the city of Grand Forks proved to be an exceptional lesson in practically all phases of a campaign as well as the phases it can progress -- and deteriorate -into.

There are three major factors in any campaign:

- 1. The identification of the voter
- 2. The utilization of the candidate's time

3. The utilization of the candidate's money. These three factors will be related to the campaigns of each of the four Republican candidates for the three available nominations.

A tall, quiet man with a bit of a southern drawl, Senator George Longmire was an artist at his own method of identifying the voter. It was an uncanny ability to create the impression that he knew everybody personally and that everybody knew him as well. The George Longmire experience was admittedly a subtle one. There was no flamboyance, no spotlighted showmanship, no belting to the back room. In the heat of the campaign in the middle of August the Senator was seen on the streets of the city with his arms outstretched around four voters like some father

comforting his children. He arrived at a shopping center on a Friday evening and through the maddness of families scurrying about for their week's groceries calmly handed out 2500 of his cards. He utilized his time carefully and effectively, relying on the scores of personal friends who maintained the pace steadily and to the end (98).

As the other three candidates accelerated activity to the point where any concept of reality became fogged, Longmire maintained a stable and responsible bulwark through it all. Probably just as dramatic was the demonstration of the advantage of an incumbent financially. George Longmire is a prominent attorney in Grand Forks with no pressing financial problems. He could have injected relatively large sums of money into his campaign if he had considered it necessary. He did have hand out cards printed, but his newspaper advertising consisted of one front page banner strip shortly before the election. He had no television spots; and a very few radio announcements during the final days of the campaign consisted of a personal appeal to the voters on his past record.

Voter identification became the most important factor in Longmire's election. First, he is exceedingly well known in the community. He was a student at the University of North Dakota Law School. He cemented relations with law enforcement people in the city through service as a detective in the polic department, and through the elected position of states attorney.

Politically he has been in the State Senate since 1956. He served as Chairman of the Legislative Research Committee and was a former State Chairman of the North Dakota Republican Party. George Longmire became a master at voter identification, and it became his source of strength in Grand Forks (99).

Richard Larsen had two major problems to take into consideration in deciding between running for re-election to the House of Representatives and running for one of the three Senate seats (100). The first of these was his youth. The fact that he had been only 27 years old as a candidate for the House was an advantage while it could have become a disadvantage in a Senate race. The second problem was finances. Larsen did not have an independent supply of funds to support a wide ranging campaign. Time was needed to find ways to bring money into his effort (101).

He definitely did have an advantage from the experience of the campaign for the House two years before, and the contacts made during those two years. In Grand Forks, some ties with the University were beneficial, and Larsen had served on the staff of the Economics Department until his first election. Because of restriction in the state's constitution he was forced to resign, this "state position". However, he was able to maintain his contacts with the teachers and administrators (102).

Larsen was born and raised in Grand Forks, but had

been absent for a number of years attending Harvard and the London School of Economics. He did not approach the voter identification of George Longmire.

In initiating his campaign, Larsen utilized what is known as a contribution ratio study. Basically, this is used to determine the time remaining to election day as related to areas of effective potential vote. The technique has been previously used with much larger numbers of voters, but Larsen reasoned it could very possibly work in Grand Forks. The number of days remaining was divided into the number of Republican votes cast in the last general election. Granted that more Republican votes were cast in the general election than in the primary normally; but they were all still definitely potential if approached. This gave the number of voters per day who should be contacted. Then, by analyzing the breakdown of Republican votes in each precinct, the amount of the time to be spent in that precinct was determined. When the time is extinguished, he moved on to another area whether he was through in the first area or not. In other words, Larsen had to learn to adjust to the time available, and also to cover all parts of the district (103).

Along with this, Larsen made the judgment that when talking with voters, a mere greeting was extremely, if not totally, ineffective. He decided that at least a few minutes was needed to be spent with each party discussing specific issues. This led to Larsen's spending a

great deal of time researching individual topics, obtaining information about those people who would be interested in them. Membership in service organizations, etc. was noted. He made specific mention of people who had signed his petitions (104).

On a brief trip to Minnesota one weekend, Larsen located an old printing press which he purchased. This was hauled back to Grand Forks with the assistance of movers, chains, pulleys, and a truck, and was lowered into the basement of his temporary headquarters. The press was hand-fed, and nights were spent cranking out material (105).

Next came Larsen's critical need for volunteers. All the material was insignificant if people could not be found to help distribute it. Therefore, the fact that Larsen attracted these people was probably the most important part of his campaign. They came from a vast cross section of people -- insurance executives to teachers, students to hairdressers. They all were willing to contribute time to spread the campaign to every block (106).

The lawn signs and pole signs were supplemented with radio advertising. However, this was questionable because of a critical shortage of finances. A committee was then established to attempt to collect from parties interested in Larsen's candidacy. This committee became significant because it solicited funds from a great many \$1 to \$5 contributors, and was responsible for nearly all of the campaign's resources.

The real basis of the effort of Larsen himself rested with the door-to-door campaign. As mentioned he considered it important to be informed of issues and to discuss them with the people in their homes (107).

As the campaign progressed, patience and morale became the most important factors. The decision was made to continue the door-to-door campaign rather than to prematurely begin mass advertising (108). An incident occured a few weeks before the election which emphasized the need to maintain this patience and morale. Larsen had stopped to talk with a man mowing his lawn (a Democrat it turned out) and a dog ran up and grabbed him by the leg. It bled all over the sidewalk and ruined the day. A friend had to drive around every day to be sure the dog was being watched. Mere speculation as to the consequences had the dog been diseased kept Larsen uncomfortable for some time (109).

Another incident reported later apparently occured in Larsen's "headquarters" late one evening. He heard the sound of a radio upstairs, dashed across the basement, up the stairs, around a shelf and looked straight down the barrel of a 45 revolver -- a policeman's. He had tried the door, found it unlocked and was reporting it to his headquarters on his two-way radio (110).

As the campaign progressed into the final week, the door-to-door effort continued. At this time a radio announcer with a very deep voice, from a nearby city, volunteered to make up radio ads. These were stressed to

associate people with the candidate at different periods during the day. For example, at times when women would be expected home a relatively soft, slow tone was used. During the dinner and supper periods when men were also expected to be listening, a bit of a faster-paced format with more copy was used. These were played approximately every 15 minutes during the final days of the campaign (111).

A last minute contribution allowed Larsen to purchase three television spots of 60 seconds each. The last surge began the Saturday before the election when the volunteers carried it to the climax. They moved across the city replacing torn signs and lawn posters. At the same time, they went door-to-door distributing hand-out cards and discussing Larsen with the voters (112).

The third candidate, Ken Lowe, was an older man, and a life-long resident of Grand Forks. He had been involved in several small businesses and for many years had been a projectionist in the city. This last career associated him with labor unions; he was able to stress it effectively during the campaign by relating it to the Party's need to attract more of the large number of labor union people (113).

Lowe was also able to create a strong voter identification through his public service. He had served as a city councilman and had served in the North Dakota House from 1957-1963, from the north end of the city. This gave

him a geographical advantage because all the other contenders were from the south. It is true that most of the Republicans live in the southern part of Grand Forks. However, Lowe was able to accentaute his importance to those people through stressing the need to attract Democrat support for the fall election. He used pole signs early in his campaign and quickly replaced those torn or covered. They were probably a bit small though, especially for four lane streets where cars move faster and are further away from the signs (114).

Although not as exact as Larsen's drive, he was more familiar with the north end of town than Larsen. Being a theatrical person, he stressed gimmicks such as dressing up as an Indian scouting for votes. These may have appeared to be stilted at times, but were inexpensive and well-covered by the press.

Mrs. Lowe became one of the candidate's greatest assets. She had been a Democratic State Senator and knew well the problems of campaigning in a fairly heavy Democratic area. She enthusiastically assisted in his organization and provided much of the advice needed to lend stability to a long campaign (115).

The fourth candidate for the three positions, Paul Bridston, had a great many initial advantages (116). For example, his background included a Yale education, a lifelong city residence, and an exceedingly well-known family name. His father, Joseph Bridston, had been a State

Senator. He also had a very strong financial base. He is president of a savings and loan company begun by his father.

However, Bridston's tactics were substantially different from the other three candidates (117). His campaign opened up in mid-summer with bill boards proclaiming his candidacy. They properly pushed his strongest asset -- the name. Yet, conspicuously minimized was the word Republican. This was certainly not illogical considering the 1964 elections. Then came the hand-out cards. They stressed his education, his business experience, his government experience; yet nowhere was there any reference to his being a Republican. Then came newspaper ads -- constantly. Bridston was standing on an outline of the State of North Dakota. In his hands were papers marked with problems the state faced. Initially they were effective. Soon they were not even noticed -except as something that must have been expensive (118).

The radio ads signaled a perplexing part of his campaign. Many of them were on an East Grand Forks, Minnesota radio station -- owned by a Democrat legislator.

The listener heard the gruff voice of a labor union man extolling the candidate as "a friend of the working man." It appeared this candidate had actually conceded himself the primary and was already priming for the November election. Yet that conclusion was fogged by the fact that no union bug appeared on the hand-out cards -- usually

included as a matter of course by all candidates (119).

A large scale television campaign was also mounted. The attractive candidate, a good speaker, sat on a desk and for several minutes discussed primarily his background. Again, in retrospect, it appeared these would have been effective if more sparingly used. But the fact they continued night after night, and coupled with other ads, appeared to create a negative reaction by convincing the average Republican that this fellow was spending more than the Party itself was accustomed to spending. This image tended to be heightened by a large lawn party at his mansion a few weeks before the election (120).

As the results came in, the first precinct to report was a rural one. Longmire led, with Bridston, Lowe and finally Larsen behind. The second precinct, a low Republican precinct, was led by Bridston, an indication the effect of advertising in an area where the other candidates spent little time. However, these were small vote precincts; and as the larger areas reported Larsen surged into the lead, with Longmire close behind. The real contest developed between Lowe and Bridston. Bridston finally began to trail and finished far back in forth place. The general appearance, then, was that Bridston's campaign was out of touch with his final goal (121).

CONCLUSION

In summary, effective voter identification was of

greatest importance. Apportionment of the candidate's time was second, and the money utilization was third in <u>relative</u> importance.

Longmire stressed voter identification cultivated over a period of time. Larsen, on the other hand, achieved the same results with a systematic door-to-door campaign, assisted by volunteer workers.

Bridston's voter identification was low because of a mal-use of his time and financial resources. In contrast to this Ken Lowe, with the disadvantage of age in a grueling campaign, used a more rational system of time and money.

Larsen's victory was certainly the most outstanding. The general characteristic was one of a young, well-informed, highly educated candidate who wisely used all resources at his disposal. This application of scientific methods in the future will certainly make it more feasible for the state party to rally support for financing these ideas on a state-wide basis (122).

The primary campaign was also significant with regard to the problem of reapportionment. A number of Republican candidates had to become accustomed to new districts. These altered districts also pitted a number of incumbent legislators against each other.

The new 28th legislative district became a painful example of this readjustment problem. The district com-

bined all of Dickey County with a part of LaMoure County. Senator Earl Redlin of Ellendale in Dickey County, and Senator Emil Nelson of Edgeley in LaMoure County both filed for the one seat. Former Senator C.G. Kee from Ellendale then also filed to make it a three-way race. With approximately 2/3 of the votes being in Dickey County, Nelson's only hope was that Kee would possibly divide Redlin's vote enough to enable him (Nelson) to slip in. Redlin began preparing early, however. He ran hard, peaking his campaign on a planned schedule and finished well in front of the other two (123). The same problem also appeared in three other areas and forced the retirement -- at least temporarily -- of Senators Bencer N. Kjos of Drake, Theron Strinden of Litchville and Don Kisse of Holliday (124).

One of the most encouraging races occurred in the Democrat stronghold in the northern 9th district. This district encompasses the vicinity around Belcourt, Dunseith and Rolla -- where Republicans have not been elected in recent memory. The campaign began no differently than in past years: a discouraged Party, out of funds and out of candidates.

A short time before the filing deadline, Congressman Andrews' field man, John Perbowski, attended a meeting at Rolla and argued that the district must encourage more Young people to become involved as candidates. The advice Was well taken because a short time later six candidates

had filed for the Senate and House nominations. The intent was to encourage activity and then back the strongest candidates after September 6th (125). The groups' enthusiasm was perhaps a bit overly active, however, because one young fellow (Gene Nicholas of Bisbee) was encouraged to run for the Senate without realizing he was actually too young (126). With a little closer planning he could have run for a House seat and would have been an extremely strong candidate.

The primary campaign was also significant in 1966 because of the part it played in the strengthening of the Republican Party machinery statewide. This can be illusstrated in two races:

In the city of Fargo, the Party organization down to the precinct committeemen were highly critical of Representative Jacque Stockman's voting record in the 1965 legislature. They claimed that his degree of support of Democrat programs hurt the effectiveness of Republican objections and alternatives.

As the filing date approached, three other House and Senate candidates joined him, and the main issue became clear. Campaign Chairman Tom Wold appealed to the Party workers on the basis that if the challenge was not met squarely, the organization's effectiveness would be critically impaired for years. Even though Stockman was popular with the people, he was not gaining support from those who would decide his fate. The Fargo Republicans

backed for the endorsed slate, and all four challengers were defeated (127).

In the city of Dickinson, 300 miles to the west, Sam Burgess -- the man who narrowly missed receiving endorsement for West District Congressman -- filed for a seat in the State House. It placed the district Republicans in a difficult position because they had earlier encouraged him to run. At that time he expressed little interest, and the Party endorsed Mike Olienzk and Donald Froelich for the two open House seats. When Burgess decided finally to run even without Party endorsement, the organization had no choice but to stand with those already in contention. The Party rank and file rallied to their organization and Sam Burgess finished third (128).

The State Party organization insisted on directing the efforts of Public Service Commission candidate Richard Elkin, and Labor Commissioner endorsee Everett Paulson. Elkin was unopposed. However, Paulson was challenged by Orville Hagen from the far western part of the state. When the results came in Hagen had defeated Paulson handily.

A number of factors contributed to Hagen's victory, but they came mostly from Paulson's deficiency rather than Hagen's attributes. Paulson had difficulty appealing to the Party rank and file because the Democrats hit him hard for voting against the establishment of the Labor Office in the 1965 legislature. It indicated a weakness that could prove even more damaging in the fall campaign. An-

other problem was the fact that Paulson was weak in speaking before large groups. He was highly effective at the convention on a person-to-person basis, but at coffee parties and larger gatherings, Party people spotted a problem in fluent communication.

Along with this, the state Party insisted on running the campaign for Paulson and Elkin out of the state headquarters. The state officers were convinced that the establishment of an effective State Republican Party machinery had to begin sometime (129). But the people in the headquarters (except for Harvey Larson, who was not officially on the staff) had never before organized a statewide campaign. At the same time, the headquarters was organizing statewide meetings stressing organization at the district level and was facing the perpetual problem of finances.

Paulson, as a candidate, was an extremely hard campaigner. In Grand Forks shortly before the election, Dick Elkin mentioned that the two worked supermarkets until 10 p.m. and met with local Party people later, finally getting to bed after 1 a.m. Paulson was up before dawn walking around the room either practicing a delivery or thinking of more things they could be doing (130). It was just not enough.

It was difficult, but the Senior Party pledged to support Orville Hagen during the fall election. Hagen, then, agreed to work and cooperate with the state Party.

After winning his battle for convention endorsement, Tom Kleppe wasted no time getting on the campaign trail. His staff directors, Alan Eastman and Him Schlosser, soon discovered Martin Vaaler of Elgin could be a potentially dangerous competitor in the primary election (131). A former Public Service Commissioner, Vaaler was well known. He was a powerful speaker and presented an impressive appearance at gatherings. He was from a rural area in a very rural Congressional district. His campaign had no lack of funds, and he used them in impressive advertising with a stress placed on television. He also impressed a great many people with the courage to come to the convention and talk about the issues and his candidacy whenever asked.

The word "courage" is used because Vaaler was a member of the John Birch Society, and he knew beforehand any reception would be cool at best. During the campaign he wisely directed his literature and personal effort to the Party people. Rather than telling them to endorse him, he appealed for the opportunity to be heard. The considerable vote earned indicated he definitely was heard.

Kleppe, on the other hand, was getting too close to the final goal to let his effort slip now. During the 1964 campaign, he never let up his drive. Even when the inevitable defeat cast depression over his aides, Kleppe never lost his enthusiasm. He definitely was not going to lose it now. He shook hands at rodeos, rode horses on ranches, drove tractors on farms, spoke to college students on

campuses. He maintained his drive and his people stayed with him. After nearly three solid years of the hardest work, this first victory at the polls was a sweet one indeed (132).

Vaaler did receive considerable support. Kleppe quickly pointed out that most of those votes were a result of his personal candidacy and not a result of a wildly resurgent John Birch Society. The Vaaler vote did concern Kleppe, however, and so he began to plan an elaborate final drive for the November election (133).

Political scientists often criticize North Dakota politics on the ground our incumbents are hardly ever defeated. Perhaps the real significance of this primary election was to illustrate that North Dakotans have still not lost their pasttime giving candidates a merciless time before they ever do take office. Three of the four Congressional delegates fought for years before ever earning that job. Congressman Andrews had no competition in this primary, but he had a close race involving a third candidate in 1964. And before that he lost a battle for Governor by only 2,000 votes.

CHAPTER IV

THE FALL CAMPAIGN

The State Republican Headquarters bustled with activity Wednesday morning, September 7. Preparations had to be completed for the September 10th Executive Committee meeting. Chairman Secrest instructed the staff to prepare distribution of a Republican Report to "all District Chairman, County Chairman, Womens' Federation Presidents, Central Committeemen, Executive Committeemen, Legislative candidates, and all other candidates and office holders." This report was to be sent out weekly to create immediate and continual communication of campaign progress to the rank and file (134).

Completion of distribution of a second campaign manual for the general election was scheduled. Arrangements for two seminars sponsored by the Republican National Committee September 20 and 21 were finalized. Statewide coordination of arrangements for the Nixon luncheon in Minot September 22 were completed. Campaign management seminars were scheduled in the marginal legislative districts. Finally the kickoff of the campaigns of the statewide candidates took final form (135).

At the September 10th Executive Committee meeting,

a resolution was passed supporting Orville Hagen for the Labor Commissioner post on the "No Party Ballot." The decision was made to place Hagen's name on the guide cards, but not to include it on the billboards and other advertising media (136). Finances were again emphasized, as only approximately 1/3 of the 1966 quota had been turned in to date and the treasury was nearly depleted (137). Shirley Lee of Bismarck and Darlene Watne of Minot were presented with plaques "for their outstanding work in the Republican Party as volunteers -- Mrs. Lee for her assistance with the State Party reorganization, and Mrs. Watne for her superb job of organization of the State Convention" (138).

On the 19th of September, the counties in the state carried out the election of the officers of their respective parties. The Republican state organization encouraged the county Party to immediately break-up into the legislative districts and elect those officers. It was a calm and orderly day over the state for both parties, except for one county -- Grand Forks (139).

The reapportionment which affected the state legislature did not apply to the precinct committeemen in 1966. And in the case of Grand Forks County, the city had nearly 75% of the voting population, but the rural area had 75% of the precinct committeemen -- one for every single township. Still Chairman Clayburgh decided to run for reelection and his opponent became George Bowman, a member

of the John Birch Society (140).

The voting proceeded, and Herb Stennis counted the secret ballots. He shook his head and counted again. Clayburgh had lost -- by one vote. The 18th district then moved to the basement of the County Court House and elected district officers (141). All the city people elected or appointed to the county organization resigned (except for Henry Kennedy) and the city finally recognized it had to take care of its own organization and leave the rural area to its fate. The damage was done, however, and the news headlines indicated that the entire county had been "taken over" by the Birch Society.

During the final campaign the Birchers became active in attacking the Republican legislative candidates in the city. The candidates reacted with a breakfast meeting at the Ryan Hotel and issued the following statement:

It is obvious from the news releases and activities of Birch Society members that the John Birch Society has joined forces with the Democrats in an attempt to defeat the nine Republican state legislative candidates of the 18th Legislative District.

We, as members of the Republican team of the 18th Legislative District, would welcome the opportunity to run against the Democrats instead of the John Birch Society. We would welcome the opportunity to debate the Democrat tax package instead of the Liberty Amendment.

We run against the record of the Johnson-Humphrey-Freeman administration and the wasteful spending of the Guy-Omdahl-Obie administration.

The group said it would welcome the support of every thinking Grand Forks citizen, whether Republican,

independent or Democrat, who is interested in responsible representation (142).

At one point, the Society placed an ad in the <u>Grand</u> <u>Forks Herald</u> which characterized the city candidates as dogs dangling from the strings of a free-wheeling Senator Young. At least two of the candidates seriously considered issuing a libel suit; and the members listed in the disclaimer printed a public apology and resigned from the Birch Society (143).

One seminar sponsored by the National Committee was held in Bismarck at the Holiday Inn on September 20, and the other was held in Fargo at the Oak Manor the following day. The meetings were open to all Republicans and consisted of a buffet lunch followed by a number of workshops. It was the intention of these workshops to explain the operation of the national organization and its relationship to the state; and then to make available any material and information which could assist in the individual campaigns (144).

A second set of seminars was scheduled for the 14th and 15th of October in the same two locations. These were billed as extremely important and confidential and no members of the press were admitted. The reason for this was that in early September the State Party had contracted to have a poll taken to determine the most advantageous ^{issues} to be used in the fall campaign. It was this poll that suggested the relative popularity of the 3% sales

tax, unpopularity of an increase in income taxes, and adoption of state withholding (145).

On September 26, Chairman Secrest once more urged all candidates and campaign directors to make a time ratio study and to contact the headquarters if any confusion existed as to technique. Starting with the first part of October, correspondence from the state headquarters arrived every second or third day. This consisted of copies of minutes, meeting and seminar information, financial reports and individual pleas for quotas, State Republican Reports, and Legislative Bulletins (dealing specifically with state assistance in the legislative races). Then, on Thursday, October 13, a total of 100,000 campaign cards were sent out to all legislative candidates in the single senator districts (146). Campaign materials were distributed to all legislative candidates relative to preparation of news releases and advertising.

At this point the State Party returned to stress the importance of peak organization at the precinct level. A contest was initiated to give an expense paid trip to Washington, D.C., to the precinct committeemen who turned out the greatest percentage increase of Republican vote. With the financial picture becoming critical, Chairman Secrest sent out the following note to all precinct committeemen on October 10th:

Mr. Peter Carey is doing his best to get all the district quotas which have been assigned to each district. However, leadership in some of these districts

is not on the ball. If this district leadership lets it go much longer, it is missing quite an opportunity in collecting quotas. Interest in this campaign will be at its peak from this point until election day. Hence, you should get your finances in order NOW. Excuses for not collecting them are no longer applicable, and some of you so-called leaders should be ashamed of yourselves for your lack of performance in dealing with such a serious matter as politics (147).

Many people who witnessed this leadership would certainly question its effectiveness. However, the Chairman initiated this style early during his term and maintained it continuously. At nearly every meeting of Party leaders he took a few moments to get his ire up. In fact, a good part of most of the business meetings was terribly dull and tedious, and sometimes part of the enjoyment came in anticipating the tell tell remarks of the Chair, "Now, as long as I'm Chairman . . . " (148).

This writer never once heard adverse comment to this "style". In fact, it appeared that most sincere Party workers appreciated being told to work harder once in a while. In any event, it was always used sparingly, just for a few moments, then dropped. One week later Finance Chairman Carey reported that several of the districts had sent in quotas.

The final stretch began, and most of the exciting races were in the western half of the state. In the 4th legislative district the Democrat incumbent Clark Van Horn had no opponent at primary election time. Then Herb Geving of Parshall entered the race and pulled even as the final days of the campaign approached. November 10th the impossible happened and Geving became the district's new senator (149).

The race for West District Congressman became extremely tight. A Huntley-Brinkley election projection gave incumbent Rolland Redlin the edge, and reports constantly filtered to Kleppe's staff and the state headquarters that he (Kleppe) just was not getting any response from the farmers (150). For weeks, the candidate had to fend discouragement within his own ranks and carried a substantial part of the load himself (157).

It was the last part of October that a trend began to appear. The candidate's speaking ability had improved considerably. He was much more at ease with voters and took more time with each one. In an October 26th Associated Press release, Kleppe stated:

Two years ago I was on the defensive. People said I was on the wrong side. Now it's just the opposite. Now the Democrats are on the defensive and people no longer say I'm on the wrong side (152).

However, even Tom Kleppe could do only so much. Monday, November 7th, most candidates were pursuing last minute votes, and Kleppe was home in Bismarck. He stated to friends, "If I haven't presented myself by this time, it's too late" (153).

The city votes came in first, and Kleppe carried Bismarck by about 2,800 votes -- just about identical to the Short vote when he was defeated by Redlin two years before. When 25% of the precincts reported, Kleppe led by 1,500 votes. At the 50% level the lead increased to 2,300. The lead settled at the 2,300 level as 2/3 of the precincts reported.

It was these last rural precincts that defeated John Davis by 900 votes and Mark Andrews by 2,000 votes, and Don Short by 2,000 votes. This time they did not go Democrat and the Kleppe lead increased some more. When it reached 4,000, Rolland Redlin conceded.

The State Party became seriously concerned about the Elkin candidacy shortly after the primary election. Repeated reports indicated that Elkin had not gained voter association; and those who had heard of him felt he was opposing the retiring Public Service Commissioner, Richard Thompson (his opponent's name was also Thompson). The Party appealed directly to the precinct committeemen. It urged in a Legislative Bulletin October 26th that all rank and file Republicans rally behind Richard Elkin. On that same date Richard Thompson released a statement clarifying that he was not a candidate and that he supported Richard Elkin. Finally, Elkin himself sent out a letter to all precinct committeemen asking their help in the final days (154). When the results were in Elkin had compiled more than 60% of the vote, and the Public Service Commission remained with the Republicans.

In the race for Labor Commissioner, Hagen had the advantage of a well-known name, but the disadvantage of

little claim to the loyalty of the Party workers. He had bucked the Party to run for Commissioner of Agriculture and Labor as an independent in 1962. Yet, in 1966 he easily defeated his Democrat opponent with just under 60% of the vote.

Perhaps the one distinguishing factor of the Congressional race in the Eastern District was that it was never in doubt. An extremely well-known and popular Mark Andrews ran for re-election in a Republican district in a "Republican year" against a Democrat unknown with the name Sebastian Fabian Hoffner, nicknamed Buckshot.

The Democrat attack against Andrews seemed to concentrate in three areas: 1) criticism of Andrews' objection to importing Rumanian hogs, 2) criticism of Andrews' using one of his staff members as his campaign manager, and 3) criticism of Andrews' alleged talk in North Dakota as compared with his votes in Washington (155). But no matter how he tried, Hoffner just could not make headway, When Hoffner attacked Andrews for alleged failure to support Social Security, Andrews sent out thousands of pamphlets explaining the new Social Security amendments. When Hoffner appeared on television spots and demonstrated an obvious nervousness and speech difficulty, Andrews released professionally recorded interviews from his Washington office. When Hoffner spoke at a small luncheon on the Second floor of the University of North Dakota's Student ^{Center}, Andrews spoke for an hour and a half to 300 students

So it went. Finally Hoffner covered the newspapers shortly before the election with ads claiming "we just didn't have the money". Andrews fired back the following statement:

The 1966 east district congressional race will be remembered as 'the year the Democrats dodged the issues'.

Instead, there has been a chorus of negative noise, a blizzard of false and inaccurate charges . . . a touring team of top dog Democrats on a mission of vilification and deception . . .

Never before in state politics have the people been expected to wade through a stream of vicious Democrat tactics that concentrated solely on slipping, sliding and ducking the issues so paramount in this campaign.

The people deserve truth and they are entitled to know what a man stands for -- not who he is against (157).

Finally Andrews switched his major emphasis away from Hoffner and concentrated on the Republican legislative candidates and the Republican statewide candidates. When the balloting was over, Andrews had amassed close to 70% of the popular vote and had carried in all but a handful of legislators.

The Republican Party attempted to create a "teamwork image" with the legislative races. The districts appealed to the voter to "send an all Republican team" or "this time send nine". The legislators attempted to publicize this with breakfasts, coffee parties, and group campaigning.

Along with this, the Republican Women's Federation in districts such as Grand Forks presented a voter profile of the candidates in their homes and printed the newspaper ads a few days before the election.

Stressing the team also meant stressing the diversity of occupation of the candidates. For example, signs proclaiming "Elect the 3 Ls", referred to the Labor, Law and Learning background of candidates Lowe, Longmire and Larsen.

It was with the 1966 goal of recapturing the legislature that the Republican Party in North Dakota prepared in May of 1965. The final results gave Republicans 44 of 49 seats in the State Senate and 83 of 98 seats in the House of Representatives. These newly elected Republicans quickly became aware of the reality of a clearly visible opportunity and a clearly visible obligation. The Republican Party in North Dakota met the first test in 1966. The task now remaining became one of justification of the faith of those thousands of voters.

APPENDIX A

The North Dakota 1966 Republican Platform

June, 1966

The Republican Party of the State of North Dakota reaffirms our faith in the American competitive system which has produced the greatest nation in the history of the world; and in order to help secure justice for all mankind, we invoke the blessings of our creator, and offer to the people of our state the following Principles and Platform.

We have confidence in the tried and tested Constitutional system of checks and balances, wherein the legislative branch is more than a rubber stamp for the executive.

We believe in responsible citizenship, and continue to fight against the intrusion of governmental control into every phrase of life, against further regimentation and the creation of a welfare state, wherein we would be stifled by rules, forms and bureaucratic regulations, and wherein we would all become dependent in some degree upon federal payments and governmental dole.

A sound dollar is essential, and hence we launch a renewed attack against the policy of unbridled public debt, annual deficits, monstrous waste, and the massive tax load which mushrooms year after year, and steals our savings and our property through the great robber: Inflation!

We are confident that our people will recognize

among our opponents the real "re-actionaries" of our country who would lead us back to giant centralization of power, with an uncontrollable federal bureaucracy having its throne in Washington.

We offer to the people of North Dakota a political party which welcomes differences of opinions, for anything else leads towards dictatorship.

We enlist the help of all citizens, whether they call themselves liberal because they love liberty, or progressive because they love progress, or conservative because they believe in conserving that which has proven its worth.

1. The Republican Party of North Dakota shares the resentment of every farmer and all the people of North Dakota over the unjustified blame placed on farmers by the present Democrat Administration for inflation and the higher cost of living. Agriculture is the only major part of the American economy, which today sells its commodities for less than they brough 15 years ago; and this at a time when the cost of everything the farmer must buy has been increasing sharply year after year.

The Republican Party therefore pledges its support for a sensible Farm Price Support Program with a minimum of controls and free of unnecessary complicated regulations; continued support for the "Food for Freedom Program", enacted in the Eisenhower Administration and which has greatly relieved starvation in other countries and has greatly increased our American farm exports; support for

soil and water conservation programs, which were first sponsored by Republican Administrations; and we further advocate adequate funds for agricultural research and extension work, the School Lunch Program, the Special Milk Program, REA, RTA and FHA loans, and especially for the Watershed Program which originated under the Eisenhower Administration.

Hundreds of families are being drive from the farms each year. We can no longer tolerate ruling officials who want to eliminate more of our rural families, and who urge the boycott of farm products to further decrease farm income.

2. We favor no new taxes and will oppose any new "tax package", but if needed we favor an increase in sales tax provided, however,

a. Exempt grocery foods.

b. That a reasonable portion of the sales tax be returned to the school districts on a per pupil basis.

3. We favor efficient operation of local and state government.

4. We seek high quality education for every student in a system of properly financed schools capable of attracting and retaining competent and adequately salaried teachers.

5. We urge improvement in the programs for mental health, special education, and vocational training.

6. We continue to support our present Wage Order

Labor Laws.

7. The question of lowering the voting age to 19 years should be submitted to a vote by the people.

8. Further effort must be applied on both State and Federal levels to provide greater opportunity for our Indian people, and to grant to our first citizens a full voice in shaping their future destiny.

9. The men fighting for us in Viet Nam have our full support and our deepest gratitude. They deserve the additional support of an Administration policy which will accomplish an early and honorable victory and peace. We will continue to support veterans' programs.

10. We favor economic development to utilize our resources, increase jobs, and retain our capable young people.

CONCLUSION

These are standards we will support, not as members of the left or right, but as Americans and Republicans, fervently determined to strengthen and protect our heritage.

In this platform we have avoided wild and unlimited promises. We leave this to the Democrats, who promise something for everybody, and who make and break promises with equal abandon.

The repulsive trend toward Centralism brought about by the Democrats, their weak-kneed and tottering foreign policies, the immense tribute we pay to foreign nations under the name of "foreign aid", the decay of our national pride at home, and lack of respect for our Nation abroad, compels us to parade their failures before the eyes of a patient people.

We appeal to all citizens who hope for the future, to join in this battle; and in support of these principles, we renew the pledge of "our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor!"
