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REPORT OF MEMORIALS

W. B. ARNOLD

William Bruce Arnold, four times state's attorney of Grand Forks County, past commander of the Grand Forks post of the American Legion, died in Grand Forks on August 7, 1941.

He was born in Vandalia, Illinois, September 28, 1895, and came to North Dakota when he was two years old. He attended the public schools at Stanley, and was enrolled as a student in the University of North Dakota. Here his educational training was interrupted by his entrance into the military service of his country in March, 1918, and he was in the officer's training school at Camp Grant when the war ended. Having been discharged from the army on November 30, 1918, he returned to the state, completed his law course at the University, and on July 14, 1919, was admitted to the Bar.

Mr. Arnold was a member of the Grand Forks County, the North Dakota, and the American Bar Associations. Fraternally, he was a member of the Knights of Columbus, of the B. P. O. E., and of the Lions Club. During his career, he served as grand knight of the Knights of Columbus, and was a devoted member of the Roman Catholic Church in Grand Forks.

As a veteran, he was a member of the American Legion and the Forty and Eight.

On August 19, 1920, Miss Veronica B. Bird of Grand Forks and Mr. Arnold were united in marriage, and to this union were born three sons and two daughters, all of whom survive him. His death left vacancies in civic, religious, and fraternal services which were hard to fill.

G. R. BRAINARD

Glenn R. Brainard was born in Dalton, New York, on February 28, 1878. There he attended the grade and the high schools, and entered Alfred University, from which he was graduated in 1904 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Afterwards Mr. Brainard entered the law school of the University of Buffalo and received the degree of LL.B. from that institution. Almost immediately thereafter he came to North Dakota, locating at Anamoose in McHenry County, and was admitted to the Bar of this state by examination on December 7, 1907, though having been admitted to the Bar in New York in a previous year.

In 1909 Mr. Brainard opened an office in Hebron and practiced there until 1921, when he removed to the city of Dickinson and there practiced his profession until the day of his death. He occupied a large niche in civic affairs there, won the respect and confidence of the people, and was rated as one of the leading

lawyers of that portion of the state; and it was in Dickinson that he died on July 16, 1941.

On November 24, 1908, Mr. Brainard and Miss Kathryn Losey of Lansville, New York, were married at Fargo, North Dakota, and the widow, together with one son, Franklin, and two daughters—Gladys, and Mrs. J. Henry Barneck, survive him.

JAMES S. CARR

James S. Carr was born on March 11, 1858, in Richland township, Missaukee County, in the state of Michigan. Four years thereafter the family removed to Ontario County in New York, and there Mr. Carr attended Canandaigua Academy for four years. After his graduation, he entered the teaching profession and taught school for a short time. He then entered Cornell University, from which he was graduated after four years' attendance. He then reengaged in the teaching profession for two years, and in September, 1886, was admitted to the Bar of the state of New York by examination. Later he came to Minnesota as a teacher in Excelsior and in Glenwood. After the close of his work at Glenwood, he removed to Minto in this state, and was principal of the schools there.

Beginning with 1893 Mr. Carr was salesman for the American Book Company and Ginn and Company, school book firms, for ten years, and thereafter returned to the teaching profession. He taught school at Rugby and at Kensal; and thereafter took up farming, but for the last thirty years practiced law at Kensal, being a typical country practitioner.

In August of this year, Mr. Carr was stricken with severe illness, and entered the hospital in Jamestown, and died there on Wednesday, August the 13th, 1941.

Mr. Carr never married, and so far as known, he had no immediate relatives in this state. Those who knew him best, his brother practitioners of Stutsman County, said of him in their memorial service, "His clients were like himself, modest and poor. He took life as it came to him as a simple, unaffected and kindly man."

C. B. CRAVEN

Carl Beaconsfield Craven was born at Kellogg, Iowa, on March 20, 1880, and died in Carrington, North Dakota, on August 20, 1941. He received his early education in the public schools of his native town, and later entered the law department of Drake University, graduating therefrom with the degree of LL.B. in 1901. He was then admitted to the bar of the state of Iowa, and for one year practiced law at Thompson, Iowa. Feeling that the great northwest offered better opportunity for ser-

vice, Mr. Craven came to Carrington, North Dakota, on or about the first day of April, 1902, and on the 24th of March, 1903, was admitted to the Bar on his certificate from Iowa. From that time on Mr. Craven remained a resident in Carrington and was actively engaged in the practice of his profession until the day of his death.

Mr. Craven was state's attorney of Foster County from 1908 until 1912, and served as mayor of the city from 1917 until 1919. At the time of his death he was city attorney for the city of Carrington, a member of the Foster County Insanity Board, treasurer of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, and secretary of the County Junior Fair Association—a position which he held from the inception of the association.

Because of his very nature and generosity of disposition, he took an active part in the civic life of the community. He took a special interest in the question of fire protection, and he organized the first experimental fire school that was conducted in his section of the state, and later the state association took up the program. He was a past president of the North Dakota Firemen's Association. He was a member of the volunteer fire department of his city, he served as state's attorney of Foster County for several years, as city attorney and mayor of the city of Carrington, and in numberless other ways showed his interest in civic affairs. For many years he was engaged in the abstract business, and at one time was president of the state organization.

Mr. Craven was a member of several bodies of the Masonic bodies, of the Kiwanis Club, and of the Shrine, and gave freely of his time and experience in the furtherance of the work of these organizations.

He was survived by his wife and three children, and by four children from a previous marriage.

Thus passed from life to death a member of the bar who for almost forty years was a driving force in his chosen profession, in the city of his home, and in the state of his adoption.

OLE ELLEFSON

Ole Ellefson, state's attorney in Benson County, died May 10, 1941. He was born in Stavanger, Norway, April 10, 1888. His father being a ship captain, the son traveled over much of Europe, visiting England, Ireland, Denmark, Germany, and France. In 1903 he graduated from a private military school and came to the United States the same year. After spending some time in the harvest fields, he engaged in farming to secure means for furthering his education. He took a course of instruction at a business college in Fargo, and entered the law department of the University of North Dakota, where he received his degree in law in 1916, and the same year was admitted to the bar

of this state. Immediately he began the practice of law at Minnewaukan, and continued therein until the day of his death. In 1937 he was appointed state's attorney of Benson County, was elected in 1938, and reelected in 1940.

Mr. Ellefson was active in Red Cross work, fraternal associations, and especially in educational work as a member of the local school board. He was a member of the M. W. A., and the Sons of Norway.

On July 14, 1921, Mr. Ellefson and Miss Adeline Engelhorn intermarried, and to this union were born two sons, who with the widow, survive.

As said by his local newspaper, "Ole was known all over the county and was highly respected. He was an able attorney and served his private practice and the public well. His attention to duty, from the time he first came here as an immigrant lad, marked him, and his successes he honestly earned."

A. M. KVELLO

In the death of Alfred M. Kvello, this Bar Association has lost one of its past presidents. In commenting upon his death, the local newspaper said,

"Alfred M. Kvello, dynamic veteran of the North Dakota bar; untiring worker for youth; perennial leader in civic affairs in Lisbon; past president of the North Dakota Bar association; Ransom county state's attorney from 1902 to 1908; 32nd degree Mason; El Zagal Shriner; product of Lisbon's public schools and the University of Minnesota was laid to rest here Monday following services at his home at 2 p. m."

His death occurred on Thursday, April 10, from a heart ailment from which he had been suffering for many years.

His parents migrated to the United States from Norway in 1871, and Alfred M. Kvello was born in Fargo on March 26, 1877, thus being truly a pioneer. He graduated from the law school of the University of Minnesota in 1901, and was admitted to the Bar of this state on the 17th day of September of that year. He began his law practice in the office of the Hon. P. H. Rourke, United States district attorney of the state. In 1915 he formed a partnership with the Hon. Sidney Adams, and the firm of Kvello and Adams was well known throughout the state.

In 1903 Mr. Kvello married Myrtle Cooper of Redwood Falls, Minnesota, and to this union was born one daughter. Mrs. Kvello died in 1917, and on June 19, 1922, Mr. Kvello married Miss Ellen Rutherford. One son, Allan, was born to them, and this widow and his two children survive.

The account in the local newspaper summarizes the work and worth of this distinguished past president. The various civic bodies of which he was a member all testified to his energetic and wise service. He was buried from the Presbyterian Church, in the choir of which he had sung for so many years.

A. C. LACY

Ambrose C. Lacy of Fargo died on Monday, September 30, 1940, following a heart illness of two months' duration.

Mr. Lacy was born June 6, 1873, at Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin. There he attended the public high school, from which he graduated, and Sacred Heart college, now known as Campion College. Thereafter he took work at the University of Tennessee, but returned to his native state and entered the law department of the University of Wisconsin, where he was graduated in 1901. He was admitted to the Bar of North Dakota upon examination on September 16, 1902, and opened a law office at Lisbon. However, in the fall of that year he came to the city of Fargo and practiced law there until the day of his death.

In 1933 Mr. Lacy was President of the Cass County Bar Association. In civic life he was active in the preservation of the wild life of this state, was first President of the Cass County Game Conservation Association, which replaced the Fargo Sportsmen's Association.

Mr. Lacy was a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church, active in the support of his church, and particularly in such legal work as appertained to the diocese of which he was a member.

On October 20, 1899, Mr. Lacy was married to Catherine Campion at Rochester, Minnesota, who survives him. Besides his widow, he left two brothers, J. A. Lacy of Minneapolis, and O. J. Lacy of Sacramento, California.

All of us who have known Mr. Lacy can bear testimony to his urbanity, his kindliness of disposition, and his assiduity in the profession.

A. L. PARSONS

Judge Arthur L. Parsons, as he was popularly known, born August 25, 1873, at St. Paul, Minnesota, died in a Breckenridge hospital on March 26, 1941, after a prolonged illness caused by heart ailment.

In 1878 his father came to Dakota territory and settled on a claim near Sonora in what is now South Dakota. Here his life was such as was common to a child of a pioneer farmer. He was a member of a large family, the parents of which were deter-

mined that the children should receive an education, and so, two at a time, the Parsons children were sent to a high school in Geneseo, Illinois. After completing his high school course there, Judge Parsons taught school for two years, and then entered the law school of the University of Minnesota, where he worked his way through school, and was admitted to the Bar of Minnesota with the graduating class of 1896.

In October of that year Judge Parsons came to North Dakota, was admitted to practice on October 7, 1896, and opened a law office in Lidgerwood. Here he spent practically all of his mature life.

As said by the citizens of that city,

"Active in the civic life of the city, Mr. Parsons was one of the builders of Lidgerwood. * * He entered into the life of the community and served in various capacities on the council and school board.

"He was mayor of Lidgerwood from 1908 to 1910 and for more than 30 years was city attorney. He served as a member of the board of education and clerk of the board many years."

In 1938 Mr. Parsons was appointed judge of the county court of Richland County, and then removed to Wahpeton. He was elected in November, 1940, and was thus county judge at the time of his death.

He was a member of the Congregational Church, of the Masonic Order; and of various civic societies. He is survived by his wife; one son, Arthur D. Parsons, of Minneapolis; two daughters—Mrs. George Norby of Grand Forks; and Mrs. John Richard of Pholomath, Oregon; and four grandchildren. The local newspapers teemed with tributes from the citizens, thus testifying to the character and influence of this distinguished gentleman.

JUDGE B. W. SHAW

Benjamin Whitworth Shaw was born July 19, 1858, at Burlington, Wisconsin. His parents were natives of Yorkshire, England, and were there married in April, 1845. Shortly thereafter, they came to the United States, and to them were born eight children, of which Judge Shaw was the second youngest.

He obtained his education in the elementary and secondary school of Racine, Wisconsin, and studied law in the office of Judge Winslow, later one of the most noted chief justices of the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

In 1881 Judge Shaw came to Dakota Territory, arriving at Fargo on May 7. Two days thereafter he went to Hillsboro, where he opened a law office and practiced for three years, re-

moving then to Mandan in January, 1884. He was admitted to the Bar of North Dakota on May 6, 1891, upon his presentation of his territorial certificate.

Famous as a frontier lawyer who never lost a murder case, B. W. Shaw served as district attorney of Morton County in territorial days in 1887 and 1888; as city attorney of Mandan in 1887, and from 1900 to 1904; as state's attorney from 1905 to 1909. He was bill clerk at the house of representatives in the session of 1893, reading clerk in 1899 and assistant chief clerk in 1901. In 1894 he acted as United States district commissioner. He was appointed county judge from Morton County on November 2, 1918, to finish the unexpired term of Judge Johnson, deceased, and he remained in that office until January, 1939. He served as president of the North Dakota Bar Association during 1915-1916.

He was married May 15, 1888, to Georgia Greenwood Lanterman at Hillsboro, North Dakota. Mrs. Shaw was born in Blairs-town, New Jersey, October 22, 1861. She came to Hillsboro in 1881 with her mother and sisters to join her two brothers, Albert and William Lanterman, both of whom later came to Mandan and became prominent in the history and growth of Mandan and the West Missouri slope region. Mrs. Shaw died April 17, 1939, eleven months after the Shaws had celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary. They had two children, a daughter, Eleanor Shaw Ricker, and a son, LaRue L. Shaw.

Judge Shaw was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Mandan since 1884, and during all the years of his residence in the city had been very active in church affairs. He was treasurer of the church and conducted a Sunday School class for many years. At the time the church celebrated its golden jubilee in 1931, he compiled and read a history of the local church, which was organized August 21, 1881.

He was also a member of the Royal Arcanum and I. O. O. F. He was chairman of the Finnish Relief for Morton County in the spring of 1940, but due to failing health he was unable to do all he would have liked to do.

Mr. Shaw passed away at 3:00 a. m. December 13, 1940, in the Mandan hospital.

Thus passed to the great beyond one of the best-known lawyers in the western part of the state, a man of kindly disposition, wise judgment, and high ideals.

CHARLES A. VERRET

Charles A. Verret, for many years assistant attorney general of the state of North Dakota, was a member of the contribution which French Canada has made to North Dakota. He was born in the city of Quebec, October 6, 1880, and educated at Laval

University of that city. He was not the only member of the family engaged in the legal profession, for a brother of his, for many years, has been one of the judges of the province of Quebec.

Mr. Verret came to Rolla, North Dakota, in 1904, and entered the law office of Mr. William Bateson, for some time state's attorney of Rolette County. Later, Mr. Verret purchased an abstract business and engaged in that business at Rolla, afterwards at Mountain Home, Idaho, and later at Bowbells, North Dakota.

On December 10, 1910, Mr. Verret was admitted to the Bar of this state upon examination. At that time he was again a resident of Rolette County, and in the fall of 1912 was elected state's attorney, holding that office continuously for eight years, with the exception of a few months in 1917. During the last two years of this service, he was cashier of the St. John State Bank. In January, 1923, he removed to Cando in North Dakota, where he became a member of the firm of Kehoe & Verret, being a partner of Mr. John J. Kehoe. This partnership continued for eight years, when he returned to Rolla. In 1933 Mr. Verret came to Bismarck to accept a position as assistant attorney general, and remained in that position for five years. For a month or two he opened a law office in Bismarck, but ceased this upon his appointment as attorney for the Regulatory Department of the state. In July, 1939, he became attorney for the State Highway Department, but after suffering a stroke, he returned to Rolla in July, 1940. Recovering his health to some extent, he formed a partnership with John B. Hart, the state's attorney, and was assistant state's attorney at the time of his death. He died in the hospital of Bottineau on Wednesday, July 16, 1941.

On July 21, 1913, Mr. Verret married Miss Annie Marchand, who, with a daughter, Miss Eveleen Verret of Bismarck, and a son, Charles B. Verret of Rolla, survive. He is also survived by his aged mother, a resident of Quebec city, by his brother, Judge Hector Verret of Sherbrooke, Quebec; and two sisters, Mrs. D. Lemieux, and Mrs. Nelson Verge of Quebec.

Mr. Verret was a type of the cultured French gentlemen. He was a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church, and served his church and his state faithfully and well.

CHARLES DONNELLY

Reports have come to us of the death of Mr. Charles Donnelly of Seattle, Washington. He was born in 1876 and died August 30, 1940. Mr. Donnelly began the practice of law in North Dakota in Towner in McHenry County, having been admitted to practice in this state on March 25, 1903, on examination. He was state's attorney of McHenry County for two terms, beginning with January, 1909. While in Towner, he married Miss Anna Pitts, the daughter of an old-time pioneer of that territory. One daughter, Eleanore, was born to this union.

In 1914 Mr. Donnelly removed to Seattle. For a number of years he was in ill health, which was aggravated by an injury to his head, sustained when he was the victim of a hold-up. While in Seattle, Mr. Donnelly remarried, and to this second union were born two children.

Those of us who knew Charlie Donnelly will well remember his courtesy, agreeableness of nature, and gentlemanly characteristics.

L. D. GOOLER

LaFayette Daigneau Gooler was born in Marcellon, Wisconsin, on October 27, 1869, and died at Billings, Montana, on February 14, 1941. Mr. Gooler was of French parentage, his father being born at sea on the way to America, and his mother being born in the province of Quebec, Ontario. His legal education was gained through reading law in southern Minnesota, where he was admitted to the Bar in 1896 or 1897. Shortly thereafter he moved to Forman and was admitted to the bar of this state on April 7, 1897, by examination. In 1900 Mr. Gooler practiced law in Devils Lake and remained there for seven years. He then moved to Rolette County and practiced law in Dunseith and in Rolla for some sixteen years, returning to Devils Lake, where he practiced until the end of 1940, when he removed to Billings, Montana, to be with his daughter, Mrs. Frank O. Peterson.

During his career in North Dakota, Mr. Gooler was U. S. Commissioner at Devils Lake, and for many years served as juvenile commissioner of the district court, the territory committed to his jurisdiction comprising some four counties.

Mr. Gooler was a member of the Masonic fraternity, and served as past master of the lodge at Devils Lake. He was also a member of the I. O. O. F. and a trustee of the Devils Lake lodge.

While in Dunseith, Mr. Gooler became acquainted with and married Miss Rose Bell Hosmer, who died November 30, 1932 at Devils Lake. To this union were born one daughter, Mrs. Peterson, who resides in Billings, Montana, and two sons, Darrel N. Gooler of Riverton, Wyoming, and Major Max H. Gooler, who is stationed with the army at Dallas, Texas. The body was returned to Devils Lake, where Mr. Gooler was buried from the Methodist Church on February 19, 1941.

The newspapers of every town in which Mr. Gooler practiced testified to his genuine character, his civic life, and the influence which he exerted upon the community.

OSCAR J. SEILER

Mr. Oscar J. Seiler, secretary of the North Dakota Bar Association from 1913 to 1919, died in the city of Long Beach, Cali-

fornia, on September 24, 1940. Mr. Seiler was born at Stephenville, Wisconsin, March 12, 1879. We do not know just when the family came to North Dakota, but Mr. Seiler received his preparatory education in the public schools of Stephenville, Wisconsin, and of Jamestown, North Dakota.

When about twenty years of age, he entered the law office of Edgar W. Camp of Jamestown, and later the office of the Hon. Roderick Rose, one of the first district judges of the state. Here he received his legal training, and in 1899 was admitted to the Bar of North Dakota. He was city attorney of Jamestown from 1912 to 1918. In the practice of his profession, Mr. Seiler was very much interested in probate and real estate work, and in commercial and industrial management and litigation.

About 1923 Mr. Seiler removed to California, and in that year was admitted to the Bar of that state. He became quite prominent in the legal practice in Long Beach, was president of the Long Beach Bar Association, member of the board of governors of the State Bar of California from 1933 to 1936, was a member of the California State Bar Association and of the American Bar Association. He was also a member of the chamber of commerce of Long Beach, and of the B. P. O. E. of that state.

In 1893 Mr. Seiler was united in marriage to Rae Bigelow. To this union were born two sons, one of whom, Lynn, was associated with his father in Long Beach until 1932, when he died. The other son, Eugene Seiler, died in Minot the same year, and sometime later Mrs. Seiler died.

Some years after her death, Mr. Seiler remarried, his wife being Mrs. Frances Archibald Stribling, a former resident of Jamestown, and Mrs. Seiler has survived him.

Many of the lawyers of this state will remember Mr. Seiler and his active work in this association.

HENRY G. MIDDAGH

Henry G. Middaugh, a former resident of, and practitioner in, Devils Lake, died in Duluth, Minnesota, September 15, 1941. He is survived by his wife; his sister, Mrs. Folger; and a niece and a nephew.

Mr. Middaugh was born in New York state in August, 1871. His early education was obtained in that state; and when he undertook the study of law, he read law in Buffalo, New York, in the office of the Hon. Hamilton Ward, a former attorney general of New York. In 1892 he was admitted to the bar of New York, and after practicing in that state, came to the state of North Dakota, opening an office at New Rockford about 1897, where he was associated with the late C. J. Maddux. He was admitted to the Bar of this state on April 12, 1897. His sojourn in New

Rockford was short, for he moved to Cando and practiced there until he went to Devils Lake in the year 1900.

In 1900 Mr. Middaugh was associated with the well-known Major E. A. Maglone, and remained in partnership with him until the death of Mr. Maglone. In 1902 he formed a partnership with the late John Burke, former governor and chief justice of this state. After Mr. Burke was elected governor in 1906, Mr. F. T. Cuthbert of Devils Lake joined the firm, coming to this state from South Dakota. At that time the firm name became known as Burke, Middaugh & Cuthbert. At various times two young lawyers were associated with the firm, Mr. Rollo F. Hunt and Mr. A. R. Smythe, both afterwards removing to Duluth.

In 1914 Mr. Middaugh opened an office in San Francisco in California, but remained but for two years, and then returned to Devils Lake, where he remained for a short time, and eventually opened an office in Duluth, in partnership with Mr. A. E. Coger, formerly of Rugby. This was about the year 1917, and Mr. Middaugh remained a resident of Duluth ever since. For some time Mr. A. E. Wheeler, a former practitioner of this state, was associated with Mr. Middaugh and his firm.

Mr. Middaugh enjoyed a reputation throughout the state as one of the leading commercial lawyers. He was noted for his integrity, his industry, his sound judgment, and his courteous manner. His fame spread in Duluth so that at one time he became president of the chamber of commerce of this city. Although a resident of Minnesota, he never lost his love for North Dakota, and it was his common practice for years to return to this state during the summer to spend a few weeks at Lakewood near the city of Devils Lake. He was an intense lover of birds and of wild life, and it was his custom for years to buy feed for the birds at Lakewood and Camp Grafton, furnishing the money and establishing a fund for that purpose, which fund was administered by the custodian.

The Judicial Council of this state, when word came of the death of Mr. Middaugh, paused in its deliberations to hear several of his former associates in North Dakota speak of his high character and his integrity.

As we scan these biographies, we are impressed with the range of activities in which the talents of these deceased brethren found scope. From the ripe experience of Judge Shaw to the career of the youngest member is a space of time remarkable in the history of our state and of our nation. How fine to see that our brethren measured up to the demands on the profession! How stimulating this reflection must be for everyone of us! The practice of the profession draws heavily upon our natural resources. We are wearied with the woes, cares, anxieties, life interests of our clients. The real lawyer makes their business, their troubles his own. Thus he becomes a counselor and a

friend; and as the years roll around, the experience he gathers broadens his view, mellows his nature, and deepens his sympathy in regard for fellow men and women. Each lawyer contributes his own individuality, and it is not only proper, but it will be helpful for us to have some general reflections appropriate for the occasion.

In consultation with the President of this association, the suggestion was made that a short memorial address be given in lieu of the customary method of presenting such report, and so your committee has asked Mr. Paul W. Boehm of Hettinger to deliver such an address upon the completion of this report. Before presenting Mr. Boehm, your committee desires to move the adoption of the following resolutions:

The Bar Association of North Dakota, in annual assembly convened, having been made officially acquainted with the loss of many of our brother practitioners because of death, and recognizing their worth, their ability, and their contribution to the life of our state; and being sensible of the loss which the association has sustained:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this association bear testimony to the work, the character, and the influence of our deceased brethren;

That we place on the permanent records of this association our tribute of respect and our acknowledgement of appreciation for the work of these men;

That we tender to the family of each decedent our sincere sympathy because of the individual loss which the family has sustained, and testify that the entire state shares with them the feeling that the family and the community and the state have lost a life and character and influence hard to duplicate;

That a copy of these resolutions be mailed to the family of each of the deceased brethren as the official action of this association.

APPENDIX

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE STATE BAR
ASSOCIATION OF NORTH DAKOTA
AS AMENDED

Creation of Bar Association: In compliance with the provisions of an act passed at the 17th session of the Legislative Assembly of the state of North Dakota, approved March 11, 1921, entitled "An Act to Create, Define and Establish the Bar Association of the State of North Dakota," and for other purposes incident thereto, the membership of the Bar Association of North Dakota, in annual session assembled, adopts the following constitution and by-laws:

ARTICLE I

Name: The name of this Association is the Bar Association of North Dakota.

ARTICLE II

Objects: The objects of this Association shall be to promote the administration of justice, uphold the honor of the profession of the law, and encourage cordial intercourse among the members of the State Bar.

ARTICLE III

Membership: The membership of this Association shall consist of all practicing attorneys who have paid their annual dues and received their license from the clerk of the State Bar Board, of the State of North Dakota, and all other attorneys who have been duly admitted to practice by the Supreme Court of this state and are by law exempt from the payment of dues, and all such members shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges of the Association and to vote and participate in the business transacted at its meetings.

ARTICLE IV

Officers: The officers of this Association shall be a president, Vice President, and Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Association and hold their offices until the next annual meeting succeeding their election.

ARTICLE V

Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall consist of the President and Vice President of this Association and the Presidents of the several District Bar Associations of the state as such districts are now or may hereafter be organized, and the President whose term of office expires in the preceding year shall likewise be a member of the Executive Committee for a period until the next annual meeting after the expiration of his term as President of the Association. In the event that any such District Bar Association shall not have a duly elected President, then the President of this Association shall appoint, from the ter-

ritory covered by said District Bar Association, a member for said Executive Committee. The representative of such District Bar Association shall serve upon such Executive Committee until the next annual meeting of this Association, notwithstanding the election of a new President of such District Bar Association. The Secretary-Treasurer of this Association shall act as Secretary of the Executive Committee, but he shall have no vote.

ARTICLE VI

Duties of the Officers: The duties of the officers of this Association shall be such as usually devolve upon officers of like organizations.

ARTICLE VII

Duties of the Executive Committee: The duties of the Executive Committee shall be such as may from time to time be imposed upon it by the by-laws of this Association.

ARTICLE VIII

Standing Committees: It shall be the duty of the President to appoint, with the concurrence of a majority of the Executive Committee, such standing committees of the Association, as may from time to time be provided for by the by-laws of this Association, such appointments to be made immediately after the annual meeting each year, and such other committees as may be deemed necessary by him from time to time, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IX

Referendum: Whenever a petition signed by not less than thirty members of this Association shall be presented to the President, asking that a vote of the members of the Association be had on any measure affecting the public interest, state or national, or by way of indorsement of candidates for judicial or other office, the President and Executive Committee shall forthwith and within ten days provide for the submission of such question or measure to a vote of the members by the postal ballot, the details of which shall be prescribed by the Executive Committee. Such referendum shall be by secret ballot and thirty days from date of mailing, the ballots shall be allowed for completion of the votes. At the expiration of that time the ballots shall be canvassed by the President and Secretary, and by a Judge of the Supreme Court or District Court to be selected by the President, and the result shall be published at the capital of this state. No expression of approval or disapproval by this Bar Association on any such measure or candidacy shall be given in any other manner.

ARTICLE X

Amendments: This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the members present upon amendments which have been suggested at a previous annual meeting; or amendments which have been suggested at the next preceding annual meeting.

BAR BRIEFS**ARTICLE XI**

Quorum: A quorum of any regular meeting or special meeting shall consist of twenty-five members.

BY-LAWS**ARTICLE I**

Meetings: Sec. 1. **Regular Meetings.** This Association shall meet at least once each year, at such time and place as shall be designated for that purpose by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. **Special Meetings.** Whenever the exigency presents itself, the president of this Association may, and on request of any twenty members in writing, shall call a special meeting of the Association at a time and place to be designated by him.

Sec. 3. **Notice of Meetings.** The Secretary shall send notices of the time so selected to each member by mail at least ten days before the date of meeting.

ARTICLE II

Dues: No payment of annual dues shall be required of members of this Association if the appropriation from time to time made by the Legislative Assembly shall be sufficient to defray the legitimate expenses of the Association, but assessments of not to exceed one dollar for each member may be made upon the resolution adopted by a majority vote at an annual meeting or at any special meeting if due notice be given in the call for such special meeting that such assessment will be proposed.

ARTICLE III

Duties of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall make all necessary arrangements for the meeting of the Association, and provide in their discretion for its entertainment, prepare the programs for its proceedings, audit all bills against the Association, and the accounts of the Secretary-Treasurer, and perform such other duties as may be required by the Association. The Executive Committee shall have full power and authority in the interval between meetings of the Association to do all acts and perform all functions which the Association itself might do or perform, except that it shall have no power to amend the constitution or by-laws.

ARTICLE IV

Duties of the Secretary-Treasurer: The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep correct and full report of the proceedings of the meetings of the Association and of its Executive Committee and shall collect and receive all money appropriated by the state or otherwise collected on assessments of the membership, and keep true and correct account of the same, and shall pay out such moneys on the order of the Executive Committee from time to time and upon vouchers drawn by the President and Secretary, and he shall

make a full and detailed report of all receipts and disbursements accompanied by the vouchers and paid checks, to be submitted to the Executive Committee and to the next annual meeting after his election, and he shall file in the office of the clerk of the State Bar Board a duplicate of such itemized statement of receipts and disbursements. The Secretary-Treasurer shall give a surety bond in the sum of two thousand dollars running to the state of North Dakota, the premium on which shall be paid by the Association. Said bond shall be conditioned for the faithful accounting by him for all funds and property which may come into his hands by virtue of his office, and for the delivery thereof to his successor at the expiration of his term of office. The Secretary-Treasurer shall receive as compensation for his service such sums as may be fixed or allowed from time to time by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V

Standing Committees: There shall be appointed annually by the President immediately after his election, the following standing committees:

1. Jurisprudence and Law Reform.
2. Legal Education and Admission to the Bar.
3. Legislative Committee.

The duties of the committees shall be as follows:

1. Jurisprudence and Law Reform. The committee upon jurisprudence and law reform shall receive and consider from any member of the Bar of the state at any time proposed amendments to the code, and shall at each meeting of the Association report what changes, if any, have been made by the Legislature since the last meeting, and any modifications of the rules of practice that shall have been made by the Supreme Court and in addition to such reports shall recommend such changes in the code and in the practice as shall seem to said committee to be proper and advantageous to the end of securing a proper reform of the laws.

Three weeks prior to the date of any annual meeting it shall file with the Secretary of this Association a statement of the matters upon which it will recommend Legislative action, such statement to embody all proposed amendments to existing laws and all new laws recommended by such committees, and that upon filing such statement the Secretary shall cause the same to be printed or typewritten and that he forthwith mail a copy thereof to each member of this Association.

2. Legal Education. The committee on legal education and admission to the Bar shall confer with and recommend to the faculty of the School of Law of the State University a suitable course of study to be pursued as a qualification for admission to the Bar, and shall also confer with and recommend to the Supreme Court a standard of education and qualification to be adhered to as a pre-requisite to admission to the Bar, and shall report in regard to such matters at each meeting of the Bar Association.

3. Legislative Committee. There shall be appointed, by the President, for a term of two years a Legislative Committee of fifteen members of which the President of this Association will be chairman. The duties of said committee shall be to properly formulate all propositions approved by the Association for the enactment of new laws or the alteration and amendment of existing statutes, to supervise and direct the due presentment and course in the Legislature of legislative bills formulated by it at the next succeeding session of said Legislature, and to use, in the name of the Association, every honorable means and influence to secure the passage and enactment into a law of the measures so introduced.

ARTICLE VI

Compensation: No officer other than the Secretary-Treasurer shall receive compensation for his services, but the expenses of the officers of the Association and the members of the Executive Committee who shall attend the regular or special meetings of the Association, or duly called meetings of the Executive Committee, shall be paid out of the funds received from the State Bar Board as provided by law. Such payment shall be made upon the detailed statement to be rendered by each officer, or committeeman showing the actual cash expenses of attendance at each meeting or such meetings.

ARTICLE VII

Additional Committees: In addition to the standing committees provided by Article 5 there shall be appointed by the President, with the concurrence of the Executive Committee, such other committees as shall be necessary from time to time to effectively accomplish the purpose for which this Association is organized and to carry out the work undertaken by the Association at its annual meeting.

ARTICLE VIII

The Executive Committee shall select twice as many names as there are nominees for the Bar Board to be submitted to the Supreme Court. Attorneys may make additional nominations by a petition signed by ten men, and filed with the Secretary. Reasonable notice shall be given in Bar Briefs of the time when such petition must be filed. The Secretary shall then prepare the ballot, which shall contain the statement "nominated by petition" after all names so nominated. The ballot shall be mailed to each member of the Association thirty days before the day when it must be returned, of which date notice shall be given by the Secretary when sending out the ballot. The President shall appoint a canvassing committee to canvass the ballots. Those receiving the highest number of votes, up to the number of nominees to be chosen, shall be presented to the Supreme Court as nominees of this Association for members of the Bar Board.

ARTICLE IX

Member of House of Delegates of American Bar Association: There shall be elected in each odd numbered year one delegate to serve as a member of the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association, who shall hold his office for a period of two (2) years after his election, or until his successor has been elected by the State Bar Association, and whose duties shall conform to those prescribed by the American Bar Association and State Bar Association, and it shall be his duty to attend the annual meetings of the American Bar Association until his successor is elected. The actual expenses of said delegate so elected in attending such meetings of the American Bar Association shall be paid by this Association.

ARTICLE X

Amendments: These by-laws may be amended at any time by a majority vote of the members present and voting at any regular meeting of the Association.
