not to have confidence in our integrity or honesty and we do not make any effort, or the right effort, to vindicate ourselves. I believe this could all be changed if lawyers would just get to know each other, and become united and work more for our common good. We would be surprised to find that most lawyers are pretty good fellows, are patriotic citizens and honorable. A united bar would instill and strengthen our self-respect, would gain the confidence of our outside brethren. We would be well started on the way to remove the prejudices against our profession and the misunderstanding and misinformation about lawyers that are so prevalent. We would be more useful citizens and able to accomplish more for the welfare of our nation, our state and the community in which we live.

A year's service as president of the State Bar Association has convinced me that this organization can do little in building up morale and unity among lawyers. We meet once a year in our annual convention but do little except of a very general character. There is lots of preaching but little work. The lawyer's standing and the welfare of his profession can be built up and effectively served through local Associations, County and District. During the past year an effort has been made to have these local organizations become more active and there has been considerable improvement. Every county should have a militant bar association. There should be frequent meetings and interesting programs. In this way the lawyers get on friendly terms, and discuss their problems, and exchange advice and confidences. This gradually becomes a part of the business of lawyers perhaps more important and beneficial than work in the office or the court room. Next in importance are the district association meetings where larger groups have the opportunity to get together and legal business and affairs of perhaps a broader scope are subjects of consideration and discussion. More of these district meetings should be held. I would like to leave the suggestion with the incoming officers and committees of the State Association that they continue the work of building up and making more potent county and district bar associations. It is my firm conviction that in this way, and in this way only, can lawyers get to know and properly appreciate each other, and I believe that in this way much can be done to gain the confidence and respect of the great body of the public outside the profession.
