JALMAR OLIVER MUUS

Professor Muus was born at White Earth, N. D., in the year 1902. He attended school there and later graduated from the High School at Moorhead, Minnesota, and then finished a full course in the University of North Dakota, receiving his B. A. Degree in 1921, after which he taught in the High School at Casselton, N. D., in 1922 and 1923. He then returned to the University of North Dakota where he took a course in law, receiving his Degree of Juris Doctor in 1927, immediately after which and until in 1928 he was instructor in Norse at the State University. In 1928 and 1929 he was instructor in the schools at Scobey, Mont. He then taught in Central High School, Grand Forks city, until 1931 when he was appointed a member of the faculty of the Law School of the University of North Dakota.

In the summer vacations of 1931 and 1932 he worked in Chicago for his advance degree, and before leaving Chicago he was granted a Fellowship from the University of Chicago for outstanding work in the field of law.

Dr. Muus was married to Miss Margaret Mead of Fremount, Ohio, in 1933.

In April, 1934, Dr. Muus was taken very ill with lung trouble and on April 20th, 1934 in a hospital in Minneapolis, Minn., he passed away.

Funeral services were held for him in Grand Forks, N. D., on April 24th, 1934, and he was buried in Memorial Park Cemetery, Grand Forks, N. D.

Dr. Muus was a member of Phi Beta Kappa—honorary scholastic society; Order of the Coif, honorary law society; he was also a mem-

ber of the Lions Club and the Masonic Order, both of Grand Forks, and also a member of the Bar Association of the State of North Dakota.

Members of his household and family surviving him are his wife; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. M. Muus of Grand Forks; three brothers, Dr. O. Harold Muus, John and Meyer Muus of Grand Forks; and a sister, Mrs. J. C. Hahn of St. Cloud, Minn.

Dr. Jalmar O. Muus was one of the finest characters, and one of the most outstanding young men, not only in Grand Forks, but within the State of North Dakota. He was always a student. While in college he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. In recognition of his excellent work as a law student he was elected to the Order of the Coif. The University of Chicago School of Law recognized his merits and awarded him a Fellowship.

His sole ambition was to be well grounded in the law and to become an excellent teacher in law and government.

He threw all of his enthusiasm, and scholarship, and great attainments into his chosen work—in fact he gave the very best there was in him to that work.

He was loved and respected by his colleagues and by all of the students.

The State of North Dakota and the citizens of his home town, and more especially the University of North Dakota has lost a most capable and esteemed citizen, and an instructor and a loyal alumnus, and all join in mourning the loss of this man and teacher, who though young, was a great man in his chosen field of endeavor.

JOHN D. SCHERER

On April 28th, 1934 Mr. Scherer died at the Bottineau Hospital. He had been ill for some two years and had been practically bed-ridden for about three months before his death.

Mr. Scherer was born at Lake Crystal, Minnesota, on March 11th, 1875. His parents were John B. Scherer and Beula Joan Smith Scherer.

He attended the public schools there, and later was graduated from the Pillsbury Academy at Owatonna, Minn. Thereafter he studied law for a year at Des Moines, Iowa, and then during another year in Minneapolis. He then attended the University of North Dakota, from which institution he graduated on June 20th, 1905, and soon thereafter was admitted to the Bar of North Dakota.

He was married in 1901 to Luella Dixie Brown at Denver, Col., and two sons were born to them.

He came to Willow City, N. D., with his family in the fall of 1905 and practiced law there until his death.

In later years he was also engaged in the Farm Implement business.

Mr. Schierer was a very fine gentleman, and a good lawyer, and during the long years of his residence in the one place, he was public-spirited and interested, and took an active part in everything that pertained to the welfare of his home city and the community.

He was instrumental in starting the proceedings looking to relief for the Turtle Mountain Chippewa Indians, as a result of which a bill is now pending in Congress which would authorize the court of claims to revive the old claims of these Indians and to re-consider the same. The claim these Indians are making against the government approximates twenty-five million dollars, and is based upon their claim that the government took their lands in North Dakota without due compensation.

Surviving Mr. Scherer are the two sons, Dayton of Grand Forks, and Clark of Willow City, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at Willow City on the 30th of April. The Rev. H. W. Cannon of Bottineau, officiated, and burial was made in the local cemetery.

The funeral was attended by a large number of friends and neighbors throughout that part of the country, and by a number of lawyers from points throughout the northern part of the state.

MISS F. H. BURNETT

Miss Burnett was born in Ireland in 1885, and when quite young she came to this country and lived with her brother, Attorney W. F. Burnett.

She graduated from the High School in Dickinson and then took up the study of law, and very earnestly pursued such course for a considerable time, and then attended the Law School at the University of North Dakota, and the University of Minnesota, and finally obtained her degree, and she was admitted to the Bar of this state in July, 1918, and from that time until 1923 she was associated with Mr. W. F. Burnett, her brother, in the practice of law at Dickinson, N. D.

In 1923 Mr. W. F. Burnett went to Fargo where he engaged in the practice of law and at that time Miss Burnett joined the law firm of Crawford & Cain, and later the firm name was Crawford, Cain & Burnett, and she continued with that firm until its dissolution in 1933 when she continued on with Senator James P. Cain in the practice of law at Dickinson, until her death.

Miss Burnett did not engage in court or trial work, but little, but she became a very excellent office lawyer and was most careful and conscientious in her work, and a very safe counselor. She made a specialty of such work and she was particularly gifted and learned in the preparation of pleadings and was quite an expert in the subject of title to real estate and also in probate work.

Last year she and Miss Burnett, the daughter of W. F. Burnett, made a visit to Europe, and while absent she visited her old home and birthplace in Ireland.

Miss Burnett was a brilliant woman, and always a student and much devoted to her work, but better than all this, she was very kind and considerate of others, and was interested in welfare work, and took an active part in all matters which pertained to the welfare of the community, and it is regrettable, from our weak human view of things, that such a character should be called from her work here, and the people of Dickinson, as well as other points where she was so well known, all greatly miss her and mourn her departure.

WILLIAM BARCLAY

Mr. Barclay was born in Scotland July 1st, 1861, and received his education there, and in 1881 came to the United States.

At New York, and on May 6th, 1916, he was married to Miss Jane Shaw Gibson, but previous to his marriage he had resided in Fergus Falls, Minnesota, for about five years.

Mr. Barclay was a charter member of the Masonic Lodge at Hillsboro, and was public administrator for Steele County for a considerable length of time.

During the war he was secretary of the local Red Cross Chapter.

As far as we can learn, Mr. Barclay began the study of law in the office of the late Mr. Ames at Mayville, N. D. Later he moved to Sherbrooke where he was associated with M. B. Castle & Co., abstractors, and where he continued to practice law.

Mr. Barclay never took a very active part in the actual trial of lawsuits, but in the preparation of legal documents—including pleadings—he was very careful, neat and concise in all of his work, and the papers prepared by him in any matter, seemed to indicate a degree of particularity and fineness that is sometimes, and perhaps quite frequently, found to be lacking in the work and papers prepared by the lawyer who is actively engaged in trial work.

Mr. Barclay located at Finley—removing from Sherbrooke—in 1918.

For some time previous to his death he was a patient in a Fargo hospital.

Mr. Barclay was a very fine gentleman and had a great many friends in the different localities where he had lived, and in his professional work he was quite expert in the preparation of papers and especially in conveyancing, and he became well known in this respect. He never took very strongly to the actual trial of cases but he was a good counselor and took an interest in the younger members of the profession with whom he came in contact, and was always ready to advise them on matters of practice so far as the preparation of legal documents was concerned.

Mr. Barclay is survived by his widow, his brother John in Fergus Falls, Minn., and one other brother in England, and his sister in Scotland.

Funeral services for him were held from the Lewis Funeral Chapel in Fargo and interment was in Riverside Cemetery at Moorhead, Minnesota.

W. J. MAYER

On September 17th, 1933, Mr. Mayer passed away at Pasadena, Calif., where he had been visiting with relatives for some time.

Mr. Mayer was born at Litchfield, Minn., and there received his early education. He later attended the University of Minnesota and in 1892 obtained his law degree from that institution.

After his graduation he came to Grand Forks where he took up the practice of law, and from 1920 to 1926 he served as Grand Forks city attorney.

In his early days and after finishing his preparatory education, he taught school at various places in Meeker and Kandiyohi counties, Minnesota, and was a very successful teacher, and was well liked.

Mr. Mayer was a resident and practicing attorney of this city for about 40 years, and he was regarded as a very safe and sound counselor, and was liked and respected by all who knew him, not only because of this fact, but because of his integrity and earnestness, and when the people of this community came to know and understand these things about Mr. Mayer, they not only liked him, but had great confidence in him and in his ability, and put great reliance upon his opinions on legal matters.

He was a charter member of the Grand Forks Fortnightly Club, in which he took an active, earnest interest.

Because of failing health, some two years ago he retired from active practice, and went to Fairmont, Minn., where he visited for some time at the home of his son, Judson Mayer, when in the early part of September, 1933, he went to California to spend the winter and in the hope of regaining his health and strength, but it was all to no purpose. He gradually became worse until the end came.

Funeral services were held at his old home, Litchfield, Minn., on Friday, September 21, 1933.

His widow, and daughters, Mrs. C. J. O'Keefe of Grand Forks, N. D., and Mrs. A. F. Hall of Pasadena, Calif., and a son, Judson Mayer, of Fairmont, Minn., survive him.

Mr. Mayer was disposed to be somewhat retiring and reserved, but he was in no sense cold or distant, but very friendly and courteous in his work with the people of this community, and also with his brother members of the Bar, and his word was absolutely good on all matters, whether pertaining to the private affairs of life, or in his

professional dealings and he was thoroughly respected, not only by the people of this community, but by the members of the Bar throughout the state, and by all of the Judges in whose courts he practiced, and while there never was any appearance of affectation or pomp in any of his work, yet he was recognized by lawyers and courts as sound, and his legal opinions always received careful consideration.

His many friends here will ever hold him in kind remembrance.

HON. B. F. SPALDING

Judge Burleigh F. Spalding, 80 years old, one of the state's leading political figures since territorial days, died in a Fargo hospital early Saturday from heart disease.

He had been seriously ill only a short time.

With firm military training and a high knowledge of the fundamentals of law, Judge Spalding had served the state of North Dakota from its first concerted struggle to win admittance as a state to the Union until it took a permanent place as an integral unit in the nation's work.

That he lasted as a potent factor in the state's affairs even after retirement from active duties as chief justice of the supreme court, is attested by the fact that he took the leading part in many political campaigns for his party—the Republican party.

Mr. Spalding was born in Craftsbury, Vermont, on December 3rd, 1853, and after receiving an education in the public school of Craftsbury he decided on a military career, casting his lot with the then small but tried military institution, Norwich University at Northfield, Vt., one of the oldest military schools in the nation.

Immediately after graduating, however, he decided against a military career and served as a teacher in a small school in Vermont, studying law all the time in spare times. He finally won admittance to the bar and then migrated to the northwest, choosing Dakota Territory at Fargo for his first home. At Fargo he joined with S. G. Roberts in the firm of Roberts and Spalding.

Later, he went into partnership with Charles F. Templeton and continued in business with the latter until Templeton was appointed territorial judge at Grand Forks by President Cleveland in 1887. He then practiced alone for a short period, but later took Geo. H. Phelps. Seth Newman joined the firm also which was then known as Newman, Spalding and Phelps. Still later it became Newman, Spalding and Stambaugh. The firm gained a large clientele and won recognition throughout the state.

It was in the formation of the state and as associate and chief justice of the North Dakota supreme court perhaps that Mr. Spalding gained most prominence.

Shortly after his arrival in Dakota Territory, he was made a member of the capitol commission of Dakota Territory. From that

time on he assumed a high position in the politics of the territory, serving as a member of the North Dakota constitutional convention in 1889, a member of the joint commission to divide property, institutions and archives of Dakota Territory between the then new states of North and South Dakota in 1889. His activities extended over a period of thirty-five years, serving as chairman of the state Republican central committee of North Dakota in 1892, as chairman of the Republic Good Government League of North Dakota from 1905 to 1907 and as a member of the 56th and 58th congresses (1899-1901-1903-1905).

After serving, through the appointment of Governor Burke, as associate justice of the state supreme court from 1907 to 1911, he was elected chief justice of the highest state court. In this capacity he served from October, 1911, to January, 1915. Since his retirement from the supreme court bench, he has been active in state politics, serving as state chairman of the "Real Republican" central committee for several years in the "Real Republican" fight against the Nonpartisan League.

Mr. Spalding also made his mark in the banking field, organizing the Merchants State Bank, now the Merchants National Bank, at Fargo, and serving as its first president.

On November 25th, 1880, eight months after coming to Fargo, he married Miss Alida Baker of Vermont. Five children were born, namely, Deane B., Frances F., Roscoe C., Burleigh M., and Carleton C.

Socially he was a Knight Templar, a thirty-third degree Scottish Rite Mason and an Elk, a charter member of the World's Interparliamentary Union, a member of the American Institute of Civics, the American Bar Association, the Bar of the Supreme Court of the United States, and various clubs. He also was one of the first members of Theta Chi, national fraternity, founded at Norwich University.

WILLIAM A. McINTYRE

William A. McIntyre, 60 years old, prominent North Dakota attorney and president of the Red River National Bank of Grand Forks, N. D., died suddenly from an acute heart attack at about 6 P. M., Saturday, June 23rd, while playing golf at the Grand Forks Country Club.

With Mrs. McIntyre and his law partner, O. B. Burtness, and Mrs. Burtness, Mr. McIntyre had played 17 holes. He had just made a shot on the fairway of the eighteenth hole when he fell unconscious, and died a few minutes later.

Eminent in both law and business enterprises of Grand Forks and throughout North Dakota, Mr. McIntyre was the senior member of the law firm of McIntyre and Burtness, and a past president of the North Dakota Bar Association. His home was at 619 Belmont Road, Grand Forks.

Since 1915, when he came to Grand Forks, he had taken a prominent part in civic, social and church affairs of the city. He had served as a member of the board of directors and president of the Grand Forks Chamber of Commerce.

He had been troubled with a heart ailment for several years but had been in excellent health for the last year. Spending Saturday morning working at the office, Mr. McIntyre left there about 1:00 P. M. for an afternoon of golf. He was apparently in good health and showed no signs of illness until he stumbled and fell after playing a shot toward the last hole of the course.

Born at Medford, Minn., November 23, 1873, he was the only son of Duncan and Julia Wallace McIntyre. His grandparents had emigrated to the United States from Scotland in colonial times.

His education was received at the schools of Warren, Minn., and at Minneapolis, where he was graduated from high school in 1896. He entered the University of Minnesota that fall, graduating from the academic department in 1899 with an honorary membership in Phi Beta Kappa.

Mr. McIntyre was admitted to the bar at Crookston in 1900 and immediately began practice at Red Lake Falls. He continued there for five years before going to Fargo where he remained one year. In the spring of 1906 he established a practice at Langdon where he remained for nine years, coming to Grand Forks in 1915 after the death of his father.

In 1915 the firm of McIntyre, Burtness and Robbins was established with McIntyre as the senior member. The firm continued under that title until 1929 when George Robbins moved to California and the name "Robbins" was dropped. During his many years of law practice in North Dakota, Mr. McIntyre was identified with many important court actions. His firm represented some of the largest financial institutions of eastern North Dakota.

Politically, Mr. McIntyre was identified with the Republican party and during the World War he served as chairman of the speakers bureau of Grand Forks county. When in Langdon he was mayor of that city for two terms.

In addition to his connection with the Red River National Bank of Grand Forks he was a director of the First National Bank at Langdon and a stockholder in the Elk Valley Bank of Larimore.

Mr. McIntyre was married September 7, 1904, at Red Lake Falls to Lydia E. Fletcher. They have one son, William D., now associated with a bank at Clark, S. D.

Mr. McIntyre was a member of the North Dakota State Bar Association, and the American Bar Association. He and his family were affiliated with the Methodist Episcopal Church at Grand Forks, of which he was a trustee. He was a thirty-third degree Mason and a Shriner, a member of Acacia Lodge No. 4, A. F. and A. M.; Jared Consistory No. 2 and Kem Temple, Mystic Shrine of Grand Forks.

For the past several years Mr. McIntyre had been a director of the Grand Forks Chamber of Commerce and the Community Chest. When the Grand Forks alumni of the University of Minnesota organized here in the fall of 1931 he was named secretary of the group.

In addition to his legal practice Mr. McIntyre was interested in several agricultural projects.

He was director and vice president of the old Northern States Savings Bank, Grand Forks, until it was reorganized in the Red River National Bank, August 1, 1929. He was named a vice president of the reorganized bank, and held the post until April 1, 1933, when he was elected president to succeed C. W. Ross.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church, and he was laid to rest in Memorial Park Cemetery, Grand Forks, N. D.

Much of greater praise could be added, but we will close this Memorial with the statement that in "Mac's" death the state and his home city have lost a great, grand, good man, but his many good deeds and acts of kindness and sympathy will live on forever.

GEORGE McLAIN JOHNSON

George McLain Johnson, attorney at law of Hillsboro, N. D., was born at Quincy, Traill County, North Dakota, on February 17th, 1894, the son of John F. and Elizabeth Johnson. He received his grade education in the rural schools of Kelso School District in Traill County, North Dakota, and then attended the Model High School of the State University at Grand Forks, N. D., graduating from the Model High School in the spring of 1912. He attended the University College of Arts in 1912-13, and then devoted his time to assisting his parents on the farm at Grandin, N. D., until the summer of 1917 when he enlisted in Company L, North Dakota National Guard, of the 164th Infantry, at Hillsboro, N. D., on July 15th, 1917.

He sailed overseas December 15th, 1917, on the rechristened Leviathan. He was in various training schools in France as an instructor in automatic rifle and hand grenade practice. On August 15th, 1918, he was sent to the Officers Training Camp at La Val Bonne and commissioned a second lieutenant of infantry Nov. 27th, 1918. Following that he was on duty at General Headquarters at Chaumont, France, and in the Adjutant General's Office until March, 1919, and then still in the Adjutant General's Department on duty at Coblenz, Germany, until June 1st, 1919. On his return home he landed at New York City June 30th, 1919, and received his honorable discharge at Camp Dix on July 2nd, 1919.

In the fall of 1919 he entered the University of North Dakota as a special student in the College of Law, taking his LL.B. degree in June, 1922. During those three years he was prominent, not only in the Law School, but the general activities of the University, being a member of the university debating team all three years, winning the extemporaneous speaking contest all three years, and also played center on the university football team. He was also chairman of the student

court during his stay in college. While at the University he was initiated into the Beta Theta Pi, the Phi Alpha Delta law fraternity and the Delta Sigma Rho honorary forensic fraternity. He was admitted to the North Dakota Bar in July 1922, and at once began the practice of law at Killdeer, N. D., with his brother, Thomas G. Johnson, maintaining a branch office at Werner, Dunn County, N. D. Four months later, in December, 1922, he removed to Hillsboro, N. D., his old home county, to become a member of the law firm of Kaldor & Johnson, until February, 1924, when this firm dissolved and since that time until his death on Nov. 15th, 1933, he continued alone a general practice of civil and criminal law.

He served four years as city attorney of Hillsboro and resigned to become state's attorney of Traill County, being elected to that office in 1929. He was serving his third consecutive term in this office at the time of his death.

He was a member of the Congregational church at Hillsboro, Hillsboro Lodge No. 10, A. F. & A. M., Hillsboro Lodge of Perfection, fourteenth degree Scottish Rite, a past president of the Hillsboro Civic Club, a member of the North Dakota State Bar Association, secretary and treasurer of the Traill County Bar Association, a member of the American Bar Association, and president of the Board of Education of Hillsboro, N. D., at the time of his death. He was a past commander of Lynn Spiering Post No. 4, American Legion, at Hillsboro, and a former Judge Advocate of the North Dakota Department of the American Legion. He was a grand officer of the Grand Lodge, A. F. and A. M., for North Dakota, being Custodian of the Work at the time of his death.

He was married at Williston, N. D., Jan. 1st, 1922, to Miss Frankie Mitchell, of that city, formerly of Saluda, S. C., and a former student of the North Dakota University. They had two children, Jean Elizabeth, born March 14, 1923, and John Mitchell, born October 30, 1924, both of whom with their mother are living at Hillsboro, N. D.

On the evening of Nov. 15th, 1933, he was instantly killed by a hit and run driver, while returning from a business trip from the city of Grand Forks, N. D., where he had been investigating a state case in company with his assistant, W. M. Backstrom, and Deputy Sheriff P. C. Bakken.

Besides his wife and two children, he left surviving him his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. John P. Johnson, three sisters, Miss Kathryn Johnson, Mrs. Ruth Humphrey, and Mrs. Eva Johnson, all of Grandin, N. D., and his brother, Thomas G. Johnson, attorney at law of Hillsboro, N. D.

His funeral was held at Hillsboro, N. D., on Saturday, Nov 18th, 1933, and he is buried in the Hillsboro cemetery. His own church and other public buildings were not large enough to care for the thousands of friends and admirers who came to pay their respects at the services held on Nov. 18th, and the Savior's Lutheran Church of Hillsboro was donated for that purpose. The capacity of this church being taxed, countless mourners were congregated outside on the

snow-covered grounds listening to the addresses over amplifiers installed for that purpose. The flowers that massed the casket were wonderful tributes of love and affection.

His life was one of cheer, friendship and love, and his untimely death was a shock to the whole state as was evidenced by the wonderful floral display, countless messages of sympathy and good cheer, and the genuine sorrow that fell like a pall over the city of Hillsboro and surrounding territory.

The American Legion, with the assistance of Company L of the North Dakota National Guard, had complete charge of the services, and he was given a full and complete military funeral.

Private services were held in his home for relatives and close friends, and then public services were held at 2:00 P. M. with special music and singing. Rev. McDonald of Grandin, Rev. Clarence L. Covell of Hillsboro, and Rev. W. J. Hutcheson, Executive Secretary of Masonic Service and Education, delivered wonderful and inspiring eulogies.

J. E. CAMPBELL

In the closing hours of this Association Year, word comes to us of the death of Mr. J. E. Campbell, pioneer lawyer of the Territory, and resident of Mandan, N. D., for many years.

Mr. Campbell died on Tuesday, September 4th, 1934 in a hospital at Bismarck.

He came to Mandan in 1882 and was the first to open a law office west of the Missouri River. For many years he was police magistrate of the city of Mandan. During the years 1884-85 he served in the State Land Office.

In 1893 he attended the first District Court session west of the Missouri River.

He was a delegate to the National Democratic Convention in 1891, the first time North Dakota was represented at such a convention.

Mr. Campbell was born in Elgin, Illinois, in 1854 and attended the schools of that place, and then studied law in the office of his brother at Litchfield, Minn., and thereafter attended the University of Minnesota, from which he obtained his degree.

Mr. Campbell was a very fine citizen, an excellent lawyer, and was highly respected by all who knew him. He was honorable and upright in all things, and leaves behind him a host of friends to mourn his loss.

RESOLUTIONS

Now be it resolved that in the death of these, our brothers and members of the Association, we jointly and severally express our deep appreciation of them, of their lives, and of the services they rendered,

and that we mourn their loss, and we here and now express our deepest sympathy for each and all of the members and their respective families, and loved ones, from whom they have been taken for a time.

The departure of these honored members is just another reminder of the fact that we must all pass on and the younger members of our Association must not lose sight of the fact that time, even with them, is only a loan.

That in a membership such as the Bar Association of this state, associations are made and friendships are formed, and that in the passing of each member a rent is made in these associations, and a loss has been sustained by the entire membership.

In our relationship and while the privilege of being together is accorded us, let us all strive to emulate the principles of the Golden Rule, and deal with each other in a spirit of kindness and courtesy.

Be it further resolved that a copy of all of these brief biographies and of these resolutions be sent to the families of the departed members, and that the originals hereof be filed with the Secretary of the State Bar Association and spread at large upon the records of his office.
