REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE

To the Bar Association of the State of North Dakota in annual convention assembled, the Memorial Committee of your Association makes and files the following as its annual report:

Since the last annual meeting this Association has sustained losses in its membership in the passing of the following named members, towit:

Hon. James E. Robinson, Hon. Thos. H. Pugh Hon. Porter J. McCumber, Hon. H. W. Braatelien.

HON. JAMES E. ROBINSON

James E. Robinson was born in Michigan, where he was graduated from the State University in 1868 with a law degree. He was admitted to the Wisconsin bar and served as district attorney of Trempeleau county for one term.

He moved to Fargo in 1883, practicing law there until he was elected to the Supreme Court. Elected on a promise to cut "red tape" in the court, he refused to adjourn the court for vacation until every case pending before it had been decided. It was his claim that he brought an end to the "law's delay" in North Dakota when he became a member of the Supreme Court.

The Judge with his flowing white hair and beard, was a familiar figure in Bismarck for 16 years, having lived there from the time he became a Supreme Court justice in 1917, until 1931 when he went to the soldiers' home. He served as a member of the supreme court six years after reaching the ripe old age of 70 years.

Judge Robinson was unique in many ways and was a stickler for brevity in preparing court decisions, and frequently preferred to follow what he called "his common sense" rather than to be guided by principles of law, well established by court decisions.

He was a kind-hearted old gentleman, and his idea was that equity should have the right-of-way over technical questions or close court decisions.

Judge Robinson was defeated for re-election to the Supreme Court in 1926, when he was 80 years of age. He remained in Bismarck, but was forced to retire on account of failing eyesight and in 1931 he entered the National Soldiers' Home at Milwaukee. His health continued to fail with his eyesight, and he died at the home after a long illness.

He is survived by one son, Arthur, of Jamestown, N. D., and a daughter, Mrs. Jessie R. Broom of Stratford, S. D.

Hon, Thomas H. Pugh

Judge Thomas H. Pugh was born on July 6th, 1868 on a farm near Petersboro, Ontario, Canada.

He received his primary education in the country school near that place, and went to the Petersboro High school.

In 1887 he went to Detroit, Michigan and studied law in the office of an attorney there, and in 1891 was admitted to the bar in Michigan.

In 1897 he came to Larimore, N. D., and practiced law there and took a very active part in community life.

In 1910 Judge Pugh left Larimore for Dickinson, where he practiced law until 1920, when he was elected Judge of the District Court, and he served in that capacity until his death.

While a resident of Dickinson he served as alderman, and was also a member of the school board.

Judge Pugh was married some time prior to coming to North Dakota, and his wife and two children, Douglas Pugh, and Mrs. Gayle Austin, both of Dickinson, survive him.

Judge Pugh passed away at his home in Dickinson, January 14th, 1933, and burial was held at Dickinson, his last home in this state.

He made a success of his profession during his life-time, because of his great application, energy, earnestness and devotion to the work. As a judge he conducted his duties with marked credit to himself and to the public. He was always fair and just, and of an affable nature, and very considerate of the feelings of others.

In his home town and community he was highly respected by all who knew him, and that community and the state has sustained a great loss in his passing.

HON. PORTER J. McCumber

The career of a once very influential figure in public affairs, both state and national, was brought to a close in May of this year, when Mr. McCumber passed away.

Mr. McCumber came to this state in the early days and settled at Wahpeton, N. D., where he established a law practice which became state-wide, before he entered upon his political life.

He was a very careful, pains-taking lawyer, and a firm advocate at the Bar.

Years ago he entered politics and for twenty-four years he represented this state in the United States Senate, but it was not until Boise Penrose of Pennsylvania died in 1921, when McCumber succeeded him as Chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee, that he attained national attention. Then, and in collaboration with Representative Fordney of Michigan, he was co-author of the Fordney-McCumber Tariff Bill. His work in helping to frame this bill, together with his relations with Alex McKenzie, for many years a political boss of this state, brought him into still greater prominence, but together they formed a leverage for his opposition, and in the fall of 1922 he was defeated by Lynn J. Frazier, who has continued in that office ever since.

Senator McCumber was a very fine lawyer and a colorful and scholarly speaker, and in his death the state and the nation has lost a valuable citizen.

HAROLD W. BRAATELIEN

Harold W. Braatelien was born at Drammen, Norway, July 8, 1879 and came with his parents to Rothsay, Minnesota in 1885, where Harold then grew to manhood.

He attended school at Rothsay and then finished the four year high school course at Fergus Falls, Minnesota in two and one-half years, establishing a record for Minnesota; graduating in 1901. After attending a private school in Minneapolis and taking a year of law at the University of Minnesota, he enrolled in the Law Department of the University of North Dakota, graduated and was admitted to practice in June, 1904. Already during his student days, Mr. Braatelien won distinction as a public speaker and an effective debater. He was a member of the Fergus Falls High school debating team in the statewide contests sponsored by the Minneapolis Journal, and in 1903-4, a member of the University of North Dakota Team, debating the University of Manitoba.

After Mr. Braatelien had spent a year in the Law Office of Judge Kline at Anamoose, he practiced law at Flaxton and then moved to Ambrose, where he not only practiced law but became associated in various business enterprises. In 1908 he was elected States Attorney of Williams County and moved to Williston, where as States Attorney and in private practice, he continued till 1918, when he became a member of the Legal staff and did outstanding work for the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul.

In June, 1908 Mr. Braatelien was married to Agnes Carle of Granite Falls, Minnesota; and a boy, Newell Tollef, now nine years of age, was born to them. After her death at St. Paul in 1925 Mr. Braatelien resigned from the Federal Land Bank and moved to Crosby, where he became associated with his brother, Olaf, in the practice of law, until 1927, when he contracted tuberculosis. Placing his young son with his brother Olaf, he spent two years at the sanatorium at San Haven and then moved to Albuquerque to reside.

In April, 1932, Mr. Braatelien married Lulu M. Campbell of San Angelo, Texas, where he then located, and where he died on August 17, 1933, and is buried. He is survived by his wife, Lulu M., and his five months old daughter, Hanna Sue, who reside at San Angelo, in addition to his son by the former marriage, Newell Tollef, who resides at Crosby.

Mr. Braatelien was a keen student, a good lawyer, a sound counsellor, a shrewd and farsighted business man, a conscientious and capable public official and a highminded citizen. His high ideals and splendid character won him the esteem and confidence of all who came in close contact and association with him; and he made a host of intimate friends, who, in spite of his long battle against ill health, greatly enriched his life.

Both the profession, his many friends and the community in which he lived have sustained a great loss in his death.

While comparatively few of our brother-members have been called during the past year, nevertheless we are reminded that the Great

Reaper has not been idle all of the time, and that separation and sorrow have entered the homes of some of the families of our members. I think it was Paul who once said to a bereaved woman, that "In the midst of life we are in death." From our earliest instruction and religious teachings, and from our personal experience in life, and from observations carefully noted along life's journey, and because of our inspired faith and hope, we sometimes wonder if we are not warranted in making a transposition of Paul's remarkable utterance, and say that In the midst of death we are in life? The story of the Resurrection the yearly decay and then the reproduction of all vegetable growththe recurring foliage of trees and shrubs and of manifold flowers—all of which in season fade away, and seem to die, only to come forth and live again, and sometimes in better form, greater beauty, and more effulgent luster. If the Creator, out of a little sunshine and mud can bring forth the flowers in such a variety of colors and beauty—cause all nature to garb itself in gorgeous grandeur in what we term Springtime, is it just imagination for us to say that He can give us a new suit of clothes when the great change comes?

As we pass over the mid-day line of life, and begin our journey down the Western Slope, with the sunset scene ever before us, with time seemingly accelerated with each passing day, until the sun of our own physical life is setting, and earthly vision gone—let us not call this death, but rather in faith and hope let us view it as transition from darkness into light—the dawn of a new day—the perfect day.

RESOLUTIONS

Now be it resolved that in the death of these, our brothers and members of the Association, we jointly and severally express our deep appreciation of them, of their lives, and of the services they rendered, and that we mourn their loss, and we here and now express our deepest sympathy for each and all of the members of their respective families, and loved ones, from whom they have been taken for a time.

The departure of these aged and honored members is just another reminder of the fact that the old must pass on and the younger members of our Association must not lose sight of the fact that time even with them, is only a loan.

That in a membership such as the Bar Association of this state, associations are made and friendships are formed, and that in the passing of each member a rent is made in these associations, and a loss has been sustained by the entire membership.

In our relationship and while the privilege of being together is accorded us, let us all strive to emulate the principles of the Golden Rule, and deal with each other in a spirit of kindness and courtesy.

Be it further resolved that a copy of all of these brief biographies and of these resolutions be sent to the families of the departed members, and that the originals hereof be filed with the Secretary of the State Bar Association and spread at large upon the records in his office.
